Sexual assault is crime of violence, says crisis service coordinator

Boy meets girl.

- Boy takes girl to dinner.
- Boy takes girl home.

Boy sexually assaults girl.

It's called date or acquaintance rape and it is the most common type of sexual assault, according to Nancy Shaffer, coordinator of sexual assault crisis services at the Danville YWCA.

Shaffer spoke to approximately eight people at Monday's Neighborhood Watch meeting.

While some women are attacked by strangers, "most victims know who their attackers are," Shaffer said, adding sexual assault is not about sex. "It is an act of violence, not an act of sex."

And while most victims are women, men and children are also sexually assaulted, she said.

Man released from hospital

A Hoopeston man was released Tuesday from Carle Foundation Hospital, Urbana, following a sawing accident Monday.

Lenard Compton of Hoopeston was taken to Hoopeston Community Memorial Hospital, then transferred to Carle, after nearly severing a thumb To reduce the risk of being assaulted, Shaffer offered several suggestions.

First, she said, people must realize that they could become an assault victim. Second, people should be aware of their surroundings and consider how they would escape an assault. Finally, people should trust their instincts. "If you feel you're in danger, you probably are," Shaffer said.

Many of Shaffer's suggestions have been issued at other Neighborhood Watch meetings: locking doors and windows, locking car doors, not letting strangers in and asking for identification from repairmen.

How to handle an attack is a personal decision. "The decision to fight back is yours and yours alone," Shaffer said. "Do what you have to to stay alive."

The Hoopeston Playcrafters will present "Seven Year Itch" at 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday at the McFerren Park Civic Center.


Tickets are \$4 for adults and \$2 for children. Refreshments will be available during the performances.

Some women have had success using means other than fighting. For example, screaming "fire" has worked. Some women have told attackers they have a venereal disease, while others have recited Bible passages.

Sometimes, talking to an attacker helps. "You can appeal to his ego, make him see you as a person and not an object," she said.

A new twist on acquaintance rape is the use of "roofies," a drug which is used in European countries

for surgery patients. An attacker will put the drug

in a victim's drink. When the victim begins to feel the effects, the assaulter offers to take the victim home, but commits the assault instead.

Because of the nature of the drug, the victim has little or no memory of what has happened.

While no incidents using the drugs have been reported locally, Shaffer said her office has received reports from college campus areas where the pills are being used.

It is not only young women who are assaulted. Shaffer told a story of a 64-year-old woman who was walking home when she was stopped by a man in a car.

The man talked to her, mentioning the name of the woman's children, and asked if she wanted a ride home. "Needless to say, she did not get a ride home," Shaffer said.

Those who are sexually assaulted should remember details about their attacker, including a physical description, voice pattern and any odors noticed on the attacker.

A woman who has been assaulted should notify the police, not destroy physical evidence by bathing or washing her clothes and get medical attention. "You may have survived the rape, but you may not survive diseases you might have gotten," Shaffer said.

Reporting the crime is very important, she said,

admitting the legal aspects of sexual assault can be almost as

traumatizing as the assault. Crisis service advocates stay with women while they are questioned by police. Those questions, Shaffer said, are very personal.

Also, she said, it can take up e to go to trial. "That's a long time

to two years for a case to go to trial. "That's a long time for a victim, especially if it's a child," she said.

The YWCA's program offers assistance to those who are victims of sexual assault. Assistance includes help in dealing with police, doctors and the legal system, as well as support groups and individual counseling.
