


After a quick scan of the afternoon talk shows recently, I became increasingly disturbed by the very serious problem of domestic violence. The stories of the alleged batterers and their victims were both shocking and sad. However, the frightened faces of the children who

witnessed those violent acts remain clearly etched in my mind today.

In the past, it was difficult to intervene legally. If the victim was the spouse of the alleged batterer and was willing to testify, the case would proceed to trial

However, when a victim faced the reality of testifying against the spouse, it was common for the victim to refuse to



However, the right not to testify against one's spouse is in jeopardy. Under a new

law, once a complaint is filed, it is the state, not the victim, who controls the case and thus, the victim may be ordered to testify against a spouse.

This law clearly impacts on important, individual Constitutional rights. Nonetheless, as I watched the traumatized children tell their stories on those talk shows, I was convinced that the courts have a duty to break the cycle of violence in domestic violence cases that involve children.
