**An idea for local economic development**

 Sadly enough, Hoopeston has been hit hard by troubled economic times with the announcement of Stokely USA no longer canning corn. Another punch was thrown with the announcement of job cuts at Silgan Containers. I trust our city leaders are looking to attract new industry and economic development to the city.

As I know they are all open for suggestions from concerned citizens, I thought maybe my suggestion would be of interest and a possible solution to the problem.
