Economic downturn tops leading local news stories of 1996

The loss of jobs - and a town's identity - lead the list of top stories for 1996.

1. Corn canning discontinued

Stokely USA announced in late September that the Hoopeston plant would no longer can corn, switching emphasis to pumpkin canning.

Nine full-time year-round employees were expected to remain at the plant, but 225 seasonal local and migrant workers will not be called to work until mid-September's pumpkin season.

The announcement ended a 120-year plus history of corn in Hoopeston.

2. Silgan to lay off workers

Restructuring at the Hoopeston Silgan Container Corp. plant, announced in September, was to cut nearly one fourth of the plant's workers and half its production lines.

Those most likely to lose their jobs were workers hired after 1987.

Layoffs began late this year and were expected to continue through March 1997.

Silgan Containers purchased the plant from American National Can in August 1995.

3. City to upgrade wastewater plant

Plans to upgrade the wastewater treatment plant began in January with a proposal to purchase approximately 40 acres from Hoopeston Foods. The city purchased the property, which includes a lagoon system, for \$250,000.

The total upgrade is expected to cost \$2.1 million and would increase the amount of wastewater the city treats from 890,000 gallons per day to 1.3 million gallons per day.

The upgrade is on-going.

4. Two students killed in car accident

Two Hoopeston Area High School students, Doug Layden and Andrea Epps, both 16, died Nov. 1 in a car

accident north of Hoopeston in Iroquois County.

Miss Epps, who was driving, lost control of her vehicle on a gravel road.

The deaths sent shock waves through the community. Students gathered at the accident site to place a memorial wreath and hundreds attended funeral services for the youngsters.

5. Chronicle files suit against city

Alleging violations of the Illinois Open Meetings Act, the Hoopeston Chronicle in June filed suit against city officials for closing a portion of a June 3 revolving loan fund.

The suit came after Vermilion County State's Attorney Michael Clary did not rule against the city on a complaint filed by the paper. Clary instead requested an opinion from the Illinois Attorney General's office because the Open Meetings Act conflicts with the state's Small Business Development Act regarding confidentiality of loan applicant information.

A Vermilion County Circuit Judge ruled last week that three arguments for their actions, put forth by the city, are invalid, but gave city attorneys 28 days to present new reasons.

Meanwhile, an opinion will not be forthcoming from the Attorney General's office until the legal issue is decided.

6. Library to share Internet grant

The Hoopeston Public Library is one of five that will share an \$88,000 grant allowing it to become a spot on the Information Superhighway.

The state grant will allow the library to offer information on Hoopeston businesses and organizations and will allow patrons to access the Internet.

7. Long-time police officer retires
