Candidates set for Hoopeston, Rossville in April 1 election

Some Hoopeston and Rossville city officials will see competition in the April 1 election.

Tuesday was the last day to file petitions to run in the election.

In Hoopeston, Mayor Bob Ault is being challenged for his seat by first ward alderman Dave Borders.

The only other contest is in ward three, where incumbent Drew Allen is being challenged by Cliff Witty.

Incumbents Mike Eckersley and Bill Goodwine, in wards two and four, are running unopposed.

City clerk Don Dean will not seek re-election. His seat is being sought by Chalmers Flint, executive director of the Hoopeston Multi Agency.

Treasurer Vicki Johnson is running unopposed.

In Rossville, Mayor Merv Smith and village clerk Kathy Roark are running unopposed, but competition abounds for trustee seats.

Incumbents Tom Mills, Richard Comstock and Mick Braddock, as well as newcomers William Galloway, William Yoho, and former trustee Richard Birkey are

running for the three at-large seats.

Signing method questioned

The method used to gain signatures for one alderman's candidacy petition is questionable under state election laws.

At the Jan. 14 Republican caucus, Kathy Noland stood by the exit door, seeking signatures on a mayoral petition for Alderman Dave Borders. Noland was asked twice to stop before finally leaving the caucus.

"It's an unusual practice," said Vermilion County Clerk Lynn Foster. "The actual practice is not illegal, but we couldn't say it's definitively legal, either."

Foster said there is no attorney general's opinion on the matter, "but it was bad practice."

Borders said he was unaware of Noland's actions. "If I'd known what she did, I would've told her to stop," he said.

Hoopeston Jaycees, Chronicle, teachers honor residents at fete

Dedication to the community was rewarded Wednesday night as the Hoopeston Jaycees, Chamber of Commerce and Chronicle awarded some local residents at the annual Distinguished Service Award banquet.

Kaeb is currently involved in a project with the Hoopeston Multi Agency, developing a before- and after-school program for Hoopeston Area students, giving children a place to go when their parents are not at home.

Another honoree is working on the same program. The "Citizen of the Year" award, presented by the Chronicle, was presented this year to Chalmers Flint, executive director of the Hoopeston Multi Agency.

Flint was born and raised in Macomb, earning bachelor's and master's degrees from Western Illinois University and advanced certificates from Eastern Illinois University, all while working and raising six children.
