HA school board to hold expulsion hearing for student

The Hoopeston Area school board will meet at 7:30 p.m. Friday to decide whether a high school student should be expelled.

The student, a 16-year-old boy, faces expulsion for possessing marijuana in the school, said principal Mark Conolly.

Conolly said the drug was found after the boy was questioned in connection with another incident. School officials had the boy empty his pants pockets and found the drug.

The board will decide if and for how long to expel the student, Conolly said. Under Illinois law, school administrators may suspend a student for up to 10 days. Further punishment requires board action.

The board may expel students for time frames

ranging from 10 days to two years, he said.

Conolly said he will recommend the student be expelled for the remainder of the year. The recommendation is based on the boy's alleged involvement in the earlier incident, as well as the amount of marijuana involved. "There was enough that I thought until the end of the year was sufficient punishment," Conolly said. "I think it's adequate."

Because an expulsion hearing is a legal proceeding, the boy may have his parents present, as well as legal counsel, Conolly said.

The boy may face criminal charges as well. The incident was turned over to the Hoopeston Police Department and is under investigation, said Sergeant Steve Bane.




