V-MEG, local police make biggest cocaine bust in county history

Drug enforcement officials are calling a Wednesday morning drug bust the biggest in Vermilion County history.

Three people were arrested in Hoopeston after law enforcement officials seized approximately 17 ounces of cocaine, with a street value estimated at \$138,000.

Rosaleo Ayala, 21, Nabor Lara, 39, and Estrella Esponsia, 39, all of Chicago, were charged with conspiracy to deliver cocaine and possession with intent to deliver more than 400 grams but less than 900 grams of cocaine.

The three were being held in the Public Safety Building in Danville.

The charges are Class X felonies and carry a possible sentence of 12 to 50 years imprisonment.

Agents from the Vermilion Metropolitan Enforcement Group, as well as Hoopeston police, Vermilion County Sheriff's Department K-9 unit and Illinois State Police Criminal Conspiracy Task Force took part in the raid and arrests.

VMEG is a multi-jurisdictional drug enforcement group comprised of the Vermilion County Sheriff's Department, Danville Police Department and Illinois

Rankin residents raise stink over proposed pig farm

RANKIN—A sow-breeding operation wanting to locate in Rankin has residents there believing they're being sold a pig in a poke.

Approximately 100 residents met Monday night with officials of Heartland Pork Enterprises, which hopes to build a 3,200-sow farm approximately two miles southwest of Rankin.

Questions voiced during the meeting centered on how the company will dispose of dead animals and animal waste and whether the operation will affect the aquifer used by the town, said Lisa Austin, one of the residents who attended the meeting.

Jeff Penczek, Heartland's general manager of production for Illinois and Indiana operations, and Brian Martin, project manager for Quality Ag Builders, the construction part of Heartland Pork, answered questions "but not to our satisfaction," Austin said.

For Austin, what the operation could do to the Mahomet Aquifer is a big concern.

The aquifer supplies Rankin with water, Austin

said.

Austin said someone in the crowd asked if Heartland had ever had an accident in Illinois and that company officials said a "minor accident" occurred in Pleasant Hills. "It wasn't a minor accident," Austin said. "It was 25,000 gallons of raw hog waste. I bet it wasn't a pleasant hill anymore."

Austin, whose husband, Michael, is a trustee in Rankin, said the hog farm could also devalue property in the community. "The minute they're allowed to go up, our property values are going to go down," she said.

Odor is another concern if the site is constructed on the proposed site, 2 miles south of the village and 1½ miles west of Route 49. "Eighty percent of the time, the wind blows from that direction," Austin said. "The smell will come right into town."

The way the company has gone about planning its operation has also come under fire. "To me, they

Although residents are fighting the company coming, the state has not given approval for Heartland to open. The firm is designing a lagoon system to hold animal waste. According to reports, that design and permit application will be submitted to the state within the next 10 days. It will take approximately 30 days for officials to act on the request.

Also, company officials have not made a final decision to locate near Rankin, according to reports.

Heartland decided against opening a hog operation near Veedersburg, Ind., when residents there opposed the plan.

Heartland Pork Enterprises is headquartered in Alden, Iowa.

According to an October 1996 article, the company focuses on Cotswold breeding stock, with operations in Nebraska, Illinois and Iowa.

The company was rated 13th in a Successful Farming list of "Pork Powerhouses" in the article, with 36,400
