New chief 'looking forward' to leading Hoopeston department

A new police chief is expected to assume his duties April 7.

Carl Valentine Jr., 55, currently chief of Brookland, Ark., was named chief of the Hoopeston Police Department.

Valentine has been in law enforcement since 1970. He served in the Florida Highway Auxiliary and in an auxiliary department in Green Acres, Fla. before becoming a full-time officer. He has served as chief in Green Acres and was a marshal in Black Hawk, Ark., before assuming his current position where he oversees a seven-person department in a community of 2,000.

"T'm really looking forward to coming there," Valentine said in a telephone interview Monday. A Rantoul native, Valentine said he and his wife wanted to move back to Illinois, "so this will be like coming home."

Valentine said he plans no major changes but will review policies and practices to determine if minor changes are needed. "My first priority is to let everybody in the department know nobody's job is in danger," he said. "I think they're going to find I'm a good person to work for. I'll back them 100 percent."

Residents are also not in danger of being ticketed by the new chief. "I'm not for people hot-dogging it, writing citation after citation," he said. However, he added, laws will be enforced.

Good administrative skills, fairness and professionalism are things Valentine said he will bring to the position. "I think the most important thing is to be fair to the public," he said. "I'm (also) a firm believer in patting an officer on the back. I came up through the ranks just like they did."

Valentine describes himself as "a good police chief (and) a good cop," and said law enforcement "has really been rewarding for me."

Increased crime has made police departments "more important than they were 20 years ago," Valentine said. Major crimes, such as drugs, are something he has dealt with during his career. In fact, the drug problem has hit close to home. Valentine said his brother was shot and killed in Memphis because of drugs.

Besides assuming new duties, Valentine must also update his education. He has an associate's degree in law enforcement, and experience, including several commendations, but must take a 32-hour course and pass a test to become certified in Illinois.

This may be Valentine's last stop in law enforcement. "I'm planning on retiring there," he said.

He replaces Orval Kaag, who retired in January after

Police say alcohol involved in two accidents Monday night

Police say alcohol use caused two accidents Monday, including a multi-vehicle incident.

The first accident occurred at 5 p.m. at Shell Mart, Routes 1 and 9.


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What's that smell? Not Hoopeston, if treatment works

Hoopeston's notorious odor may be a thing of the past if a new chemical treatment is successful.

A mix of chemicals is being used on water in the lagoons for the sewer treatment plant, based on analysis of the water, said Alderman Drew Allen, chairman of the city water/sewer committee.

The solution is being provided by United Chemicals of St. Charles, Allen said, and involves a mixture that "actually destroys methane gas and (hydrogen sulfide)," he said.

The process is not inexpensive, although exact costs will not be known until a study is done on the amount of chemicals used, Allen said. "We're into it about \$4,000 right now," he said. "I've heard quotes as high as \$18,000 a year if we don't do our studies correctly."

While the product does not come with a company guarantee that the odor will be eliminated, "they're very optimistic," Allen said. "It worked in the samples."

The mix is currently being added in the lagoon but once the process is streamline, it may be added at the treatment plant, he said. In other action, the council approved spending

Fairchild was subsequently stopped by Rossville police and was returned to Hoopeston where he cited for preliminary charges of driving under the influence of alcohol, leaving the scene of an accident and operating an uninsured vehicle.

No injuries were reported.

The second accident occurred at 11:07 p.m. at 227 W. Lincoln.

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
