

Can production to stop at Silgan, 50 to be laid off

First the corn left. Now the cans are going.

Silgan Containers Corporation announced Monday to workers at its Hoopeston plant that can production at the plant will cease next year, eliminating approximately 50 jobs.

About 100 employees will continue working at the factory, making can ends.

The move is a further restructuring designed to meet competitive pressures, said area manager John Wilbert of Woodland Hills, CA.

"Our business has been flat," Wilbert said. While processed food sales have increased, canned food sales have not, resulting in consolidation and closed plants across the country, he said.

Wilbert pointed to the local picture as proof. "The amount of canning done in Hoopeston, compared to 20 or 30 years ago, has dropped," he said.

Monday's announcement will affect three of six canning lines at the plant. The other three were scheduled to be eliminated last year, but some were

saved due to unexpected orders, Wilbert said.

He does not foresee unexpected orders saving lines this time. "Business could change," he said, "but this is our best estimate."

Employees who attended Monday's meeting said the news was sad, but not unexpected.

The lines - and 14 job classifications - are expected to be gone by the end of April 1998, said employee Dave LaBounty. "It don't look good for Hoopeston all the way around," he said.

Seniority will be a factor when eliminating employees, Wilbert said, adding workers with as many as 12 years will be without work.

That means older employees will have to do the work of younger ones, which could prove physically challenging, LaBounty said. "Their knees and backs can't take it," he said. "A lot of them have carpal tunnel."
