Hoopeston under boil order after water main breaks Friday

Hoopeston is under a boil order until further notice following a water main break Friday.

Water was shut off after a four-inch main developed a large hole, said Alderman Drew Allen, chairman of the city's water/sewer committee.

The main, located south of the municipal building on Second Ave., is one of the oldest ones in the city, installed in the early 1900s. Allen said.

Years of use caused the hole, which was two to three inches wide by nearly a foot long, he said. "It was a bigtime leak."

The leak was discovered at about 6 p.m. Friday, when water was found coming to the surface. When workers opened the street, they found the area flooded.

Fire trucks pumped water from around the main to allow workers to make repairs, but could not keep up with the flow. Officials then decided to shut the system down, Allen said.

The water/sewer department did not have a proper fitting to connect a piece of PVC to the existing main, causing an additional problem. Once the fitting was brought from Champaign, "it came together pretty quickly," Allen said.

As residents slept, crews worked throughout the night fixing the leak. Once repairs were made, the system was slowly turned on again.

Water/sewer employees and members of the Hoopeston Fire Department opened fire hydrants to remove air from the system, Allen said. "They started close to the

water plant and worked their way out, like a wagon wheel," he said.

The system was opened slowly to avoid causing problems. "You can't just open the tower," Allen said. "It'll blow every main in the city out."

Many residents did not learn of the problem until Saturday morning, when activities such as showering and coffee making were made more difficult. "You'd be surprised how many people thought their water lines were frozen," Allen said, adding no one was prepared for the entire system to be closed. "It's just never happened

before," he said.

Water department clerks were brought in Saturday to field calls from residents. "They were just covered up (with calls)," Allen said.

Water was restored at about 1 p.m. Saturday, allowing residents to perform daily activities. "I told (sewer superintendent) Greg Gress to be prepared for 2,000 flushes all at once," Allen said.

Although water is again flowing, it must still be boiled until samples are deemed safe for consumption.

Water for cooking, drinking and things such as

brushing teeth, should be boiled before use. Water for bathing and laundry does not have to be boiled, he said.

Workers are expected to spend Monday reflushing hydrants; samples will probably be collected Tuesday or Wednesday, Allen said.

Those samples must incubate for 24 hours before the results can be given, so the boil order is expected to remain in effect through next weekend, Allen said.

Although the break was an inconvenience, Allen said the situation could have been much worse. No fires occurred while the water was off, although a fire alarm at Silgan caused brief concern.

However, Allen said, the alarm signaled low or no pressure in the plant's sprinkler system, not an actual fire.

The incident was a learning experience for the water department. "We really learned quite a bit about the system," Allen said.

Allen had high praise for workers, who were finally able to go home Saturday afternoon. "My hat's off to them," he said. "These guys we've got are pretty professional."

Working in adverse conditions of cold water and cold air temperatures, coupled with long hours, was a strain for the crew. "They were beyond tired - they were exhausted," Allen said. "I can't say enough about our guys."

Allen also praised street/alley workers and firemen for their contribution. "It was really a team effort of
