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Alderman concerned about costs, maintenance of landfill road

Hoopeston's portion of the access road to the landfill is nearly double what some officials expected to pay.

The road, which cost nearly \$300,000 to build, was discussed at Tuesday's city council meeting.

Alderman John Haughee questioned whether Illinois Landfills, Inc., (ILI) landfill owners, would pay more than their agreed upon \$100,000 share. "It would be good if we could encourage them to pay half the cost," he said.

Alderman Bill Goodwine disagreed. "To me, a deal's a deal when you say you'll do something," he said. "Their costs have gone up. What would you say if they wanted to pay us less?"

Construction estimates from 1995 ranged from

\$184,000 to \$300,000.

Haughee also questioned whether residential use of the road would increase the maintenance costs paid by the city.

Under the existing host agreement between ILI and the city, Illinois Landfills will pay \$18,000 annually for maintenance. If non-landfill traffic increases by at least 20 percent, the city's share of maintenance would increase accordingly.

Alderman Mark Drollinger suggested increased costs would be related to a new industry locating in the

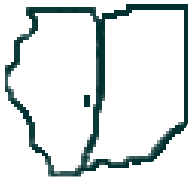

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Lorraine's Screen 2 is a boon to Hoopeston movie-goers

I have to admit that I am not a movie aficionado. There are few movies I feel I truly must see, and I've gotten to the point where I walk out of movies I consider awful.

But I recently had a wonderful experience locally, one I hope area residents will take time to experience, too.

A few weeks ago, my daughter, Jenny, and I saw *Les Miserables* at the Lorraine's Screen 2. What a wonderful experience!

We entered the lobby where the smell of popcorn tickled our noses. After getting our snacks, (and peeking through the window into the projection room) we entered the viewing area. When owner Greg Boardman and I talked about the new theater, he used the word "intimate." He was right.

Forty-seven seats occupy – but do not fill – the area. The seats are staggered, which can be truly appreciated only if you've ever sat behind a lady with a large hat or, in the 70s, someone with a large 'fro. The arrangement is such that, even when the couple in front of us put their

heads together to talk, my view wasn't blocked at all.

Another good thing about the seats is the amount of room between rows. I could stretch my legs out fully. In fact, I could have added a good 12" to my legs and still been comfortable.

When the lights dimmed and the film began, I noticed something else: the sound is quieter. It's still high-quality but the volume level is lower than that of the Lorraine's Screen 1, making it much easier on the ears. Boardman said he's received complaints from some viewers at Screen 1 that it's too loud, and in many cases, I agree with the complainers. There's certainly nothing to complain about at its sister theater, however.

No movie would be complete for me without a trip to the bathroom. At Screen 2, the restroom is to the left of the screen. Dim lights guide the way.

I'd like to thank Boardman for his efforts on Screen 2. The whole experience was a delight, one I look forward to repeating often.
