Gas rates to drop, water rates to increase in Rossville

ROSSVILLE—Trustees rescinded one utility hike and approved imposing another.

In 4-1 votes, trustees approved removing a 15 cent increase to gas fees implemented approximately three months ago and approved an estimated \$1.05 per hike in water rates.

The increase will pay for repairs to the village well. Those repairs, estimated at \$15,000 to \$20,000, will be spread over the 3.8 million gallons of water used monthly and the number of water meters, said trustee Tom Mills. That figure should result in the increase which will be paid over 10 months.

Trustee William Galloway voted against the water hike and Mills voted against eliminating the additional gas fee. In other action, trustees:

 \Box approved paying trustees chosen in the April 1999 election \$50 per meeting, up from \$30.

adopted a procedure for public speaking at meetings. Guests are to raise their hands for recognition during discussion on issues and, once recognized, will be allowed to speak for two minutes. Those who are on the agenda will be allowed to speak for five minutes.

According to a statement read by mayor pro-tem Richard Kiser, residents' questions asked during the meeting may be taken under advisement until a future meeting. Galloway objected to the procedure.

HA district, students fare well according to state averages

Hoopeston Area students – and the district as a whole – do better than average in many areas of Illinois Goals Assessment Program testing.

Statistics, released at Thursday's school board meeting, show a majority of students meet or exceed standards in most measured categories.

At Honeywell Grade School, 60 percent of third graders meet or exceed writing standards; 97 percent meet or exceed math standards and 81 percent are at or above writing goals.

In fourth grade assessments, 96 percent meet or exceed standards in science; 79 percent are at or above goals in social sciences.

Seventy three percent of John Greer sixth graders meet or exceed reading standards; 96 percent are at or above math standards; and 100 percent meet or exceed writing standards.

At the middle school, 72 percent of seventh grade stu-

dents meet or exceed science standards, while 65 and 82 percent of eighth graders meet or exceed reading and writing standards, respectively.

At the high school, 62 percent and 70 percent of tenth grade students meet or exceed reading and math goals while 38 percent are at or above writing standards.

For 11th grade students, 81 percent are at or above science standards and 83 percent meet or exceed social science goals.

Regarding the student body, 83.8 percent are white, .5 percent are black, and .4 percent Asian/Pacific Islander.

Of 1,640 students tallied, 38.3 percent are in the low income category, compared with 36.3 percent in the state. Maple School has the most low-income students, with 52 percent.

The average administrator's salary locally is \$54,817 compared with \$69,489 in all unit districts; \$60,708 in all medium unit districts and \$73,423 in the state.
