## Residents asked to perform spring cleaning on properties

Hoopeston residents are being asked to clean up before they have to pay up when ticketed for nuisance violations.

At Tuesday's city council meeting, Alderperson Susan Comstock presented a list of 53 properties in the city with violations for such things as junk cars, debris, abandoned buildings and no house numbers.

Comstock has also received complaints about vehicles blocking alleys and parked on parkways; garbage at curbside more than 12 hours before routine pick-up; and dog issues, including barking and stench.

"I'm not saying we need to do anything about it right now because it's springtime and people are cleaning up and fixing up," Comstock said, adding if owners do not clean up the properties, citations will be issued. "There's really absolutely no excuse for some of the stuff that's out there," she said. In unrelated business, the council:

## Schools, police must work together to solve juvenile crime: chief

Crimes involving youngsters might be avoided with better cooperation between school systems and police departments, according to Hoopeston's top law enforcement official.

"In our school systems today - all over the United States, not just here in Hoopeston - they never let police get involved until there's a serious problem," said Chief Carl Valentine at Monday's Neighborhood Watch meeting.

Valentine talked about recent school incidents, ranging from the shooting in Jonesboro, Ark., to those happening in Hoopeston.

One local incident involved adults asking police to test a substance believed to be marijuana that belonged to a fifth grade student. When tests proved the substance was marijuana, the adult did not want police involved. "They weren't going to tell the law enforcement official the (student's) name," he said. Through investigation, police learned the child's name and that she planned to sell the drug to another student.

School officials gave the student a five-day suspension, but police are "vigorously looking into it and we're making progress," he said.

Although Valentine hesitated saying the incident occurred in Hoopeston, city council member Susan Comstock continued questioning Valentine until he confirmed the incident happened locally. "Why do you keep trying to hide it," she asked. "The point is it happened in Hoopeston, this is where we are and we're concerned

about it," she said.

Some of the 16 people attending said they were "flabbergasted" by the incident. "The way we were raised and what's going on now are completely different things," one woman said. "There doesn't seem to be a lot of parenting."

Another resident said the problem stems from the legal system, which considers spanking child abuse. "When they took prayer out of the schools and stopped paddling, everything went downhill," another woman said.

Mayor Bob Ault agreed. "Until the paddle goes back into he school and the home and God goes back in the home and the school, this is going to continue," he said.

"I don't want to be a warrior here, but if I see a problem or a potential problem, as a law enforcement officer, we need to look into it, to do something about it," Valentine said.

"All the schools, all over, have a tendency to sweep things under the rug," he said. This causes a two-fold problem, he said. First, problems worsen, and second, adults often profit from having youngsters commit burglaries and sell drugs.

Valentine said he understands why school

districts try to solve problems in-house. First, school officials are concerned about confidentiality, but "we're not going to put in publication who the juvenile is," he said.

Second, "it's hard for schools to say 'gee parents, we might have a problem here and we might need your help," he said. However, "it's time to get these things

#### Arkansas shooting hits home for chief

The recent shooting in Jonesboro, Ark., hit home for Hoopeston's police chief.

Chief Carl Valentine lived in Jonesboro for 10 years before coming to Hoopeston. The town of about 50,000 is "kind of a laid-back city. They don't have a whole lot of violent crime," he said.

Talking to police investigating the crime, "it seems like it was a matter of getting even," he said, adding the 11- and 13-year-olds charged in the crime treated victims like ducks in a carnival shooting gallery.

"It's very hard for me to believe, and probably for any of us to believe, that they didn't know what they were doing," Valentine said, explaining how the alleged shooters stole a van, took weapons and dressed in camouflage clothes before opening fire on classmates.

"Could they really understand what they were doing," he asked. At the time they did, but I think after some time has passed, they really didn't know what they were doing."

Valentine said the youngsters told others they planned to kill someone but school officials did not notify police. Better interaction between the two may have kept the situation from happening, he said. "In my opinion, a lot of times schools are responsible," he said.


