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Hike in utility surcharge is taxing for Hoopeston officials

Increased electric and gas bills for Hoopeston residents will make up for a shortfall in the city's water/sewer fund.

By a 5-3 vote, the Hoopeston city council on Tuesday approved a two percent increase in the city utility tax.

The tax on gas and electric bills will go from three to five percent, and will raise an estimated \$132,000, said Alderman Bill Goodwine, chairman of the city finance committee.

An additional .0015 percent will be charged by utility companies to collect the tax.

The increase will offset a projected \$109,000 loss in the operations portion of the water/sewer budget, Goodwine said.

The loss was projected due to lowered water usage from Hoopeston factories. "Those gallons translate to dollars," said Alderman Drew Allen.

Aldermen Dave Borders, Harold Cox and John Haughee voted against the increase.

Borders questioned the amount spent on supplies for

lagoons purchased last year as detention ponds for the sewer treatment plant. "We don't even use them," he said, adding the only use the lagoons get is from Hoopeston Foods "and they use it for nothing."

Allen disagreed "I think Hoopeston Foods would take exception to you saying they use it for nothing," he said.

Ault agreed saying the company pays monthly bills of \$15,000 to \$16,000 for wastewater treated at the site.

Haughee questioned whether the city could recoup property taxes lost through reduced industry, but city attorney Jim Spiros said that issue is between the property owner and county officials.

After passing the increased tax ordinance, the council unanimously passed the 1998-99 budget, including \$4.18 million in expenses and \$4.36 million in revenue.

While the budget seems to show a surplus of \$181,000, Goodwine said \$107,000 of that is earmarked for the police pension fund.

The budget includes transfers to reserve funds for new equipment and a three percent increase in salary ranges.

Rossville trustees OK first budget, purchase tornado siren

ROSSVILLE—A new form of village finances was approved by the village board Monday night.

Trustees approved the first village budget, for nearly \$1.2 million, said Mayor Merv Smith.

The budget replaces the annual appropriations ordinance as a means of tracking income and expenses.

The change was recommended by the village auditor.

In other action, the board approved purchasing a new tornado warning siren for approximately \$20,000, Smith said.

The existing siren "is left over from W.W. II," Smith said. "You can't get parts for it and whether it works or

not is a flip of the coin."

The siren is expected to be mounted on a pole at the water tower.

Trustees also approved spending slightly more than \$9,000 on 10 new lamp posts and globes. The village will also extend lighting by approximately one block, Smith said.

In unrelated business, trustees approved two engineering studies, one for the village water system and the other for storm sewers.

Officials hope to loop the village water system, remove-

ing dead ends from the system. Smith said the change is expected to decrease water problems in the village.

There are five dead-end areas in the village. The cost of looping each will range from \$1,800 to \$20,000, Smith said.

Officials also plan to change from 4-inch to 6-inch line, and will have to change fire hydrants to match the new line, Smith said.

The study for storm sewers will include locating all outlets on the system. "I challenged (everyone at the

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meeting)," Smith said. "I don't think there's anybody alive who knows where they're all at."

Trustees also approved a land swap with Heather and Tim Cottingham. The couple will receive the eastern dead end of Railroad Ave. in exchange for 66 feet of clearance three lots down.

The Cottinghams will pay all costs associated with the transaction and will give the village clear title.
