

Local hospital plans \$2 million plus renovation project

Hoopeston Community Memorial Hospital will soon undergo some cosmetic surgery.

The 50-bed facility will undergo a modernization estimated at \$2-\$2.5 million, said C.E.O. Darryl Wahler at a press conference Friday.

Although officials are still working on specifics, modifications will accommodate the increased number of outpatients and improve traffic flow in the hospital. Such things as waiting rooms for radiology and lab patients, a cardiac rehabilitation area, as well as improvements in the heating/air conditioning and electrical systems are being considered, Wahler said.

Construction, which may begin as early as this fall, means the hospital must also meet new building codes established since the hospital was built in 1962. For example, hospital restrooms are not handicapped-accessible and fire doors do not meet new standards.

Hospital Building and Equipment (HBE) of St. Louis will oversee all phases of the project but will hire local contractors for actual construction, Wahler said.

Financing for the project will come first from three

sources. the Hoopeston Area Healthcare Foundation, outside loans and employee donations to Project Hope, part of the foundation.

The amount borrowed "depends on how successful the foundation is," Wahler said. "What we have left over is what will be financed." Since the hospital is running in the black, it has become more desirable to lending institutions, he said.

Officials plan to borrow enough not only to pay for modernization, but also to cover the outstanding \$4-\$4.5 million debt left from when the facility was owned by Westworld Healthcare.

Critical assess designation from federal and state governments will also help the hospital meet its new financial obligations.

Wahler said the critical access program designed for small rural hospitals, would increase Medicare payments to actual costs rather than a portion of the total. "For this hospital, it would be a significant improvement in our finances," Wahler said.

When such designation might be made is undecided. The hospital has met federal criteria and should meet state guidelines. If approved, the hospi-

The family lost all their possessions in the blaze, Laird said.
