## Gate fee increase to keep Jaycees sweetcorn festival going

Those attending this year's National Sweetcorn Festival will pay more to get in as a way of keeping the festival going.

Festival-goers will pay \$2 per day to the Labor Day weekend event, said 1998 festival chairman Gilbert Warner.

The fee, \$1 more than last year, will help pay for sweet corn next year, as well as other Jaycees projects. The Hoopeston Jaycees sponsor the annual festival.

Last year, festival proceeds paid for Jaycees Christmas projects such as the senior citizens Christmas dinner and underprivileged children's Christmas program, Warner said.

But since Chiquita Brands bought the Hoopeston Stokely plant and announced this would be the last year for company-donated corn for the event, the Jaycees have had to plan for the future. "If you pay for corn and transportation, where's the money coming from," he asked.

Rumors that corn canning will return to the factory don't help planning the festival. "You can't rely on that," Warner said.

The Jaycees hope to work out a contract with a Wisconsin grower to purchase corn for next year's festival. Transporting the corn will add to the cost, but the Wisconsin growing season is more suited to the festival's timing. Illinois corn, with fewer transportation costs, could be early or late. "You can't guarantee that it will be ready," Warner said.

Festival planners have had to deal with a more immediate financial need – rising costs for this year's event.

"Everything went up this year," Warner said. "Everything" includes carnival rides, tent rental, the petting zoo and insurance.

The decision to raise the entry fee was not made

lightly. "We kicked it around a lot," Warner said. But faced with rising costs and looking at other area events, the group decided to raise the price. "We looked at the Balloon Classing, Springfest (and other activities)," Warner said. "They don't have nearly what we have (and charge as much as \$8 to enter)."

To keep costs down for local residents, the Jaycees are offering \$5 advance gate ticket booklets, cutting the entry cost for each of the festival's five days. "Hoopeston can still get in for \$1," Warner said.

The passes will be available at the Hoopeston Multi Agency and the Hoopeston Chamber of Commerce office.
