Second screen coming to Hoopeston's Lorraine Theatre

You might call it the second act.

Greg Boardman, owner of the Lorraine Theatre, plans to open a second theater on Sept. 11 at 214 E. Main.

The new theater will be called Lorraine Theatre Cinema 2; the existing Lorraine will be Cinema 1, Boardman said.

Cinema 2 will be a scaled-back version of the Lorraine. It will seat 47 movie-goers in staggered rows of nine and 10 seats. Although Boardman could have doubled the number of seats, he preferred to provide plenty of leg room for customers. "I wanted to approximate the more intimate, comfortable atmosphere of a profession screening room, like the movie companies have for their executives," he said. All seats will have cup holders, like the original Lorraine, Boardman said,

adding the Lorraine was the first theater in the area to have cup holders.

The 10' x 18.5 foot screen will be larger than those in many multiplexes, and is made of the same quality material as Cinema 1 for bright picture.

Cinema 2 will use a smaller version of the sound components used at Cinema 1 for clean, clear dialogue and beautiful music, Boardman said. Dolby SR Stereo will be in place when Cinema 2 opens. "It's as good as you can get before you go digital," he said. Plans include certifying Cinema 2 as an HPS-4000 theater.

As an added bonus for customers, especially the young ones, will be a viewing window in the booth/ concessions area that will allow customers to see the

goings-on in the booth while the film is running.

The second location will allow Boardman to increase the number of movies shown locally. Often, new releases must be shown for four weeks. Those movies draw large crowds initially, but attendance dwindles after the second week. By moving the movie to the smaller setting, Boardman will be able to accommodate those who wish to see the film a second time or who did not get to see the film earlier, while bringing a new picture to Cinema 1.

Cinema 2 will also allow Boardman to show films he might not have been able to show before, such as *Les Miserables*. The added screen will permit "more movies, sooner, and more choices," he said.

Ticket prices at Cinema 2 will be the same as those at Cinema 1: \$2.50 for students through high school and

senior citizens, as well as for matinees, and \$5 for adults. During the winter months, Boardman may also show movies with discounted \$1 tickets.

Boardman hopes the addition will have cars lining the street from Cinema 1 to the railroad tracks. "I know this will be good for the town," he said adding he hopes residents support him. "I want everybody to come try it," he said. "The more people come, the more I can do."
