Hoopeston city council tackles specific alcohol issue

Alcoholic beverages will be served at a Sept. 20 benefit for a Hoopeston man.

The Hoopeston city council voted 5-2 Tuesday to make an exception in the ordinance banning Sunday liquor sales to allow a benefit for Eddie Hollen who was injured when he fell from a roof.

Whether the benefit would be held come into question after the Aug. 18 council meeting when aldermen rescinded a special permit issued by Mayor Bob Ault for BJ's Pump to be open Sunday, Sept. 6.

Approximately 40 people attended Tuesday's meeting, including bar owners and teetotalers, to discuss Sunday sales, as well as selling alcohol in the park during the National Sweetcorn Festival.

City attorney Jim Spiros explained that five special event licenses are granted by the city each year. The special licenses, which also allow alcohol to be sold in the park, are subject to the same limitations placed on regular liquor licenses, such as days and hours of operation, he said. However, by ordinance, the special permit is available only to non-profit organizations, he added. Spiros advised the council that they could change the ordinance or make an exception to it for the Sept. 20 benefit.

Some residents questioned why alcohol should be served at benefits. "Why can't you do it with Pepsi; why can't you do it with Coke," asked Al Walker. If you've got to have your alcohol, do it in your own home."

Others said eliminating alcohol consumption at benefits might affect attendance; others disagreed.

Saying the benefit has already been advertised, Ault asked the council to make an exception to the ordinance.

Aldermen Drew Allen and Susan Comstock voted against the exception. Both said they disagreed with making exceptions to ordinances.

While the issue has been decided for the Hollen benefit, it is far from over. The council must still decide what to do about future Sunday benefits and other activities.

Borders, chairman of the city's civic improvement committee, said his group will meet at 7 p.m. next Tuesday to discuss city liquor laws.




