emphasized. To be considered for a scholarship, local professionals should have at least two years' work experience in their proposed field of training; be proficient in the native language of their intended host country; have a firm sense of their career path and how it will be helped by vocational study in another country; and select training programs affiliated with an approved organization, clinic, company or institution.

The scholarship is a three-year pilot program to provide professionals with practical job training abroad. Scholarships are world-competitive – candidates approved by the Hoopeston Rotary Club will compete at the district level. Each district can send one candidate to compete internationally for 10 to 15 scholarships for 1999-2000.

Recipients will receive a flat grant of \$10,000 or \$15,000 for three to nine months of study based on the applicant's proposal. Special consideration will be given to applicants who plan to study in the following fields of Rotary emphases: food production, literacy, the environment, drug abuse prevention, care of the elderly or child-oriented fields.

Each year, more than 1,200 scholarships are awarded for study in another land. During their studies abroad, Rotary Foundation Scholars act as "ambassadors of goodwill" and work to further international understanding.
