Superintendent: 'unusual' winter calls for preparedness

With more than 13 inches of snow on the ground, and more predicted for this weekend, school officials are keeping a close eye on the sky.

"I think it's quite obvious to everybody that this winter is going to be quite unusual compared to recent past winters," said Hoopeston Area superintendent Mark Conolly. With the worst weather historically in mid— to late January, "I think we're just seeing the beginning of this winter," he said.

Winter weather that can change quickly poses special challenges for the school and its students, such as making sure children are properly dressed and aware of what to do when schools dismiss early.

Conolly offered tips for parents to help get students through the winter cold, including:

- **1.)** Make sure children are properly dressed, with winter coats, gloves and scarves. "Frostbite is a very real danger," he said.
- **2.)** Have a contingency plan with your child regarding where to go when school dismisses early. "Our greatest fear is we get out of school early, the boy or girl walks home and nobody's home and the door is locked," he

said. "This is particularly problematic, especially with little kids."

If the contingency plan involves having the student ride a different country bus, the bus driver should be told, Conolly said.

3.) Listen to local radio and television stations, including Channel 41, for news of closings. "When we know we're going to close, we get the information out immediately," he said.

Additionally, parents may decide not to send their child to school if they believe it is dangerous to travel, or get the child out early if conditions become dangerous. "We don't know if your particular road is open," he said. "Every parent has to make a decision."

The decision to close school entirely or dismiss early is based on several factors, including snowfall, wind speed and reports from Grant Township road commissioner Jim Crouch.

Wednesday's early dismissal was prompted by

United Fund's 1998 drive far surpasses \$30,000 goal

The money just keeps coming in.

The Grant Township United Fund 1998 campaign has netted more than \$38,000. That announcement was made at Wednesday's United Fund board of directors meeting.

The total tops the 1998 goal of \$30,000 and shows promise for meeting next year's \$40,000 goal.

Of the 1998 total, 92.73 percent is given to receiving agencies, up from 80.6 percent in 1997.

While pleased with drive results, the board hopes to

increase the total received from residential next year. The 1998 campaign collected only \$470 from that segment.

In other business, the board approved the existing slate of officers to serve a second term, including president Mike Pemberton, vice president Chalmers Flint, treasurer Aly Jackson and secretary Susan Redden.

In unrelated business, secretary Susan Redden said distribution of 1999 allocation checks began Jan. 6.

The group's next meeting is Feb. 3.
