Soil from ex-base not yet approved for local dumping

Hoopeston's landfill may get tainted soil from the former Chanute Air Force base in Rantoul.

Then again, it may not.

An Oct. 12 article in the Champaign News-Gazette stated the Illinois Landfills site in Hoopeston is slated to receive 40,000 to 60,000 cubic yards of contaminated soil from the former base.

But a landfill spokesman said the soil has not been approved for disposal at the local landfill.

"As of right now, it's not approved," said district manager Larry Shilling. "As of last week, they hadn't run the updated tests."

Shilling said the soil must be tested, either by the Environmental Protection Agency or an independent lab, to be sure it does not contain hazardous materials, which are not allowed in the landfill.

The article said the soil is from an old fire training school, and a vacant lot where the Air Force had a pump house for simulated aircraft parking ramps.

Soil at the sites reportedly contains hydrocarbons, PCBs (polychlorinated bipehnyls) volatile organic compounds.

Whether the soil is considered hazardous will depend primarily on the amounts and types of organic compounds and PCBs, Shilling said. Those substances could include jet fuel and things like transformer oil, he added.

In determining whether the soil is hazardous, Shilling said two main factors will be used: the EPA list of hazardous waste and the characteristics of the materials found in the soil.

The contaminated soil may be safer than other, more common items, Shiller said. "A truckload of (a cola product) is hazardous waste (due to its chemical composition)," he said. "People are always surprised to hear that."

Shilling said landfill officials are as concerned about keeping hazardous waste out of the local landfill as residents are. "Number one, our employees live there and they wouldn't stand for it," he said. "Number two, the liability that comes with something like that is huge."

According to the News Gazette article, the government approved \$4 million to clean up soil at the former base. Work is expected to begin the first week of November and be completed by mid-December.
