

Alderwoman says committee did not discuss alcohol sales

A Hoopeston alderwoman says a recommendation to allow liquor sales on Sunday, Dec. 31 was not done properly.

Susan Comstock said the civic committee did not meet to discuss the issue. "There was no meeting," she said.

Borders said Wednesday he did not call a committee meeting on the issue but recommended the change on his own. "I said 'I recommend' because I knew we didn't have a meeting," he said. "Everybody voiced their opinion two weeks ago. There wasn't no use in having a committee meeting."

Comstock said the committee, which includes Alderman Rod Kaag, discussed the issue after the meeting but said she did not understand the discussion to be a committee meeting. "You can't just have two people stand there and say 'I agree with it' and have one person against it and call it a meeting," she said.

Comstock, who did not attend Tuesday's council meeting due to illness, said she is angry that she was unable to voice an opinion against the variance. "If the majority voted on it, fine," she said, "but I didn't even

have a say."

Last year, the council voted to adhere to the ordinance and disallow Sunday sales for special events such as bowling tournaments and benefits. "We have set a rule, period: no Sunday sales," she said.

The change in the ordinance which bans Sunday sales means "we might as well have Sunday sales now," she said. "We can't take a stand and keep it."

Borders stands by his recommendation to allow bars to be open New Year's Eve, saying people will leave town to purchase alcohol and may drink and drive on the way home. "Would you rather they drive two blocks or 12 miles," he asked.

Although Borders favors Sunday sales, he admits he has had a change of heart on the issue. "For the first three years I was on the council, I would've voted against alcohol on Sunday but I seen businesses going down," he said.

Borders does not expect his position to be well-received by some. "I know I'm going to get flak about it," he said.

Hoopeston couple purchases Downtown Restaurant

A Hoopeston restaurant has a new owner and a local woman has achieved a dream.

Heather Funk and her husband, Jon, purchased the Downtown Restaurant at 114 E. Main, effective Feb. 1. Mrs. Funk will manage the restaurant.

"I've always wanted to do this," Funk said. "I enjoy cooking and this is what I want to do."

Funk worked as a waitress for the former owner and learned to cook "what I didn't know how to cook," she said. "It was a live and learn experience."
