

County sophomores may earn free college through apprenticeship program

Area high school sophomores have an opportunity to make money, gain work skills and earn a paid college education through the Tech Prep Youth Apprenticeship program.

The program allows students to prepare for a career while still in high school. Apprenticeships are available in automotive technology, hotel/motel, welding, manufacturing, machining, food service management and banking.

The program is a joint project of Vermilion Occupational Technical Education Center, Danville Area Community College and participating companies.

VOTEC representative Sharon Flesher will visit county schools, including Rossville-Alvin, this month to give students specific information about the program.

to rural Hoopeston, he joined Iron House and began working with Catron. "I like to do it because it makes me feel better and it's fun," he said.

With one tourney under his belt, Kellerhals is looking forward to future competitions. "I can't wait for the next one," he said, adding he and Catron will have to find meets that coordinate with their schedules.

He is also looking forward to increasing his lifting ability and moving to classes with cash purses, "but that will take a couple of years," he said. To qualify for some contests, lifters must heft a total of 1,700 pounds in the bench, dead lift and squat categories. "I can't do that right now," he said.

While waiting, Kellerhals plans to improve his strength at smaller competitions. "I'm learning techniques and some skills," he said.

To begin the process, sophomores must complete an application through VOTEC, detailing their interests and background. The applications are reviewed by area companies and students chosen to interview. After being selected, juniors and seniors take academic and technical courses in high school and at VOTEC. During summers students work a full-time internship and may have an opportunity to work part time during the school year.

After completing the last two years of high school, students enroll at DACC, with all tuition paid, while continuing to work at the companies.


