Hoopeston Area High School's drama and music departments will present "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" this weekend.

The musical is about the Biblical story of Joseph, son of Jacob, and his 11 brothers. The production is different from other musicals because it has music and singing throughout.

"We've been thinking about doing this show for a long time," said director Michael Caparula. "It's a story most people know and the music has a pop quality to it that the kids like."

The production is "more of an operetta than a musical because there are no dialogue breaks," Caparula said. "Dreamcoat" contains an eclectic mix of songs from 1960s go-go to country to a 1950s rock-and-roll number featuring an Elvis-like Pharaoh.
