City officials offer to sell ambulance service to health center

In an unexpected move, Hoopeston officials have offered to sell the city's ambulance service to Hoopeston Regional Health Center.

The offer came at Monday's ambulance committee meeting, held to hear the health center's proposal to manage the ambulance service.

After hospital CEO Frank Caruso made the facility's pitch for managing the service, Mayor Bob Ault asked if the health center would be interested in purchasing the service outright.

"We have not discussed that opportunity," Caruso said, adding the suggestion would be discussed at Thursday's hospital board meeting.

Caruso had planned to have a final presentation on managing the ambulance service for the May 1 city council meeting, but plans for a buy-out "would take a little more to work out that scenario."

Alderman Dave Borders, ambulance committee chairman, said a decision on the ambulance service could be postponed a few weeks. "My personal feeling is if you showed a great interest in that, we would be more interested," he said. "I think it's a great idea."

If the hospital board is interested in buying the service, Caruso suggested a staggered lease/purchase agreement might be worked out. "I'm not going to say we're disinterested." he said.

PRO Ambulance of Champaign, which also made a management offer, will be given the chance to submit a purchase proposal, Borders said.

City officials have considered for months allowing an outside company to manage the ambulance service. "It's getting too technical," Borders said. "We don't need to be in the ambulance business.

Under the management proposal suggested by Caruso, the health center would take over day-to-day operations, billing, stocking supplies and general maintenance of the ambulances and ambulance barn. Someone would be hired to supervise the service. Two emergency medical technicians (EMTs) would be on duty at all times and crews would work 24 hours on duty, 24 hours on call and 24 hours off duty.

Additionally, the hospital would upgrade the service to advanced life support capabilities within one year, a process Caruso estimated to cost \$25,000.

The city's part of the bargain would be to continue to provide ambulances and a place to house them, contribute money to an ambulance reserve fund, provide an estimated \$2,000 for major repairs and provide a sleep/shower area for EMTs.

Additionally, the city would provide an monthly stipend to the hospital, estimated at \$4,000 the first year, \$3,500 the second year and \$3,000 the third and subsequent years. The stipend could come from the tax levy for ambulance service which currently nets about \$50,000 annually.

Caruso estimated the city would save "at least \$132,000 in year 1, \$138,000 in year 2 and thereafter, well over \$140,000." However, Ault disagreed with Caruso's estimated savings.

"I think your projected savings to the city aren't right," he said. Under the hospital plan, the city would contribute \$48,000 in stipends and an additional \$48,000 in reserves for a new ambulance. The city's current ambulance budget is \$180,000, which includes \$60,000 in the ambulance reserve fund.

Under the hospital's proposal, as under the PRO plan, the cost of ambulance calls would increase, although Caruso could not say how much the increase would be. A higher flat rate would be implemented, plus additional charges for services and supplies used. Using figures supplied by Arrow Ambulance, a Carle affiliate, Caruso

Proceeds from the sale will help defray expenses for the club's trip to the national convention in Arlington, Tex., in June.


Rurilnet closing

estimated a net cost of \$250-\$350 per run.

Whichever entity takes over the ambulance service will be faced with purchasing a new ambulance, Borders said. The service currently has 1998, 1993 and 1989 models. The oldest one will soon have to be replaced at an estimated cost of \$100,000. The 1998 model, purchased used, cost \$75,000, Borders said.

Caruso said he sees the proposal as a long-term agreement between the city and the hospital. "I don't think the residents would take kindly to the city and hospital making an agreement and then switching it around," he said.

Also, he said, there are several good reasons why the city should allow the hospital to manage the ambulance service. "First and foremost, taxpayer dollars stay in

Hoopeston," he said. "As a taxpayer, I'd like to see my money stay in town.

Second, the city would save money by allowing the hospital to manage it. Third, the service would be run by local people and fourth, the agreement would alleviate the city's need to oversee day-to-day operations while the hospital could provide direct support to the ambulance staff.

The committee will make a recommendation on which option it favors then present that recommendation to the full city council for approval.
