Route One Association technical advisory council meets

Representatives from three state universities and four community colleges met at Lincoln Trail college recently in the initial meeting of the Route One Technical Advisory Council.

Sara Longfellow represented Dr. Alice Jacobs, president of Danville Area Community College, at the meeting.

The Route One directors voted to form the advisory group at its annual May meeting to strategically plan for the 300 mile rural transportation corridor, said association president James R. Gillespie.

Three permanent committees were established to be coordinated by the University of Illinois (local government), Southern Illinois University (data users) and Eastern Illinois University (information dissemination/communications). A fourth committee will deal with local resources and will be coordinated by public utilities and rural electric cooperatives.

Dr. Roger Beck, agri-business economics professor at SUI-Carbondale revealed the strengths and weaknesses of the 13-county corridor, which includes Iroquois and Vermilion counties. Using a model developed at SIU-Carbondale, the corridor sectors displaying the highest degree of connections with other economic sectors are

agriculture, mining and manufacturing.

Other observations from the results of the model include:

- income received from these sectors has a tendency to leave the region
- the sector offering the highest employment multiplier is agriculture.
- manufacturing and agriculture are important to the region's economy but lose their comparative advantage when examined in a value-added manner.
- a high percentage of earned income leaks from the region.
- sectors growing nationally are not growing in the region.
- the region is a goods-producing one requiring transportation infrastructure to move commodities.

Dr. Jon Van Es described University of Illinois Extension programs and services available to local groups. He focused on a variety of rural development specialists on staff and provided examples of activities, such as a business retention and expansion program designed to assist local leaders in economic development efforts.

The council also considered socio-economic data reflecting the corridor's lagging growth compared to the state.
