



Residents and birds coo about aviaries at nursing home

You might say Hoopeston Community Nursing Home is for the birds.

The nursing home on Wednesday became home to several finches, canaries and doves.

Two aviaries from Living Designs of South Dakota were put up at the facility. Each aviary contains diamond doves from Australia, blue cap wax bill finches from Africa, zebra finches, Australian shaft tails, society finches from China and Java rice finches.

The aviaries, each 8 feet long, 6½ feet high and nearly 3 feet deep, contain silk vines, tree branches and nesting materials so birds will mate, said Vaughn Canady, Living Design delivery supervisor. There is at least one pair of each type of bird except a lone male canary. Canady explained males sing more than females and sing more when no females are around to hear the mating call.

the birds, including the pecking order.

The male canary will be a the top of the order, with the bigger doves at the bottom. "You really, a lot of times, don't see a pecking order but it's there and they know where they belong," he said.

Each of the aviaries cost approximately \$4,500, including shipping, said hospital CEO Frank Caruso, Quarterly maintenance from Living Designs will cost \$100 to \$150. It is money well-spent. "The birds will be very good for the residents," he said. "Can you imagine how long it's been since some of them have heard a bird singing?"

The birds will lift their voices at 5 a.m. daily when the timed lights come on. The songs will continue until 9 p.m. nightly, Canady said.

The aviaries were a special purchase funded through a direct appeal from the Hoopeston Area Healthcare Foundation's annual support committee. Each year, the committee funds a special project at the hospital or nursing home, said chairman Dave McFadden. The committee sent 4,000 letters requesting money for the project, McFadden said. "We pretty much hit our goal," he said.

Hoopeston youth wins title

Jeramy Dobkins of Hoopeston competed in the Covington, Ind., Sycamore Classic Bowling Tournament for Youngsters.

The tournament was held, Jan. 28 and Feb. 4. Entrants bowled five games each day with a pro bowlers' style roll-off between the top five competitors. Dobkins was tied for third after the first game and moved into first place after the second game where he remained the rest of the first round.

At the start of the second round, Dobkins was leading the 12 and over group by 48 pins. After the second game he fell to second place, being down by 24 pins. He regained the lead after the third game and remained there until the second round was finished. The top five bowlers then began the roll-off.
