







Former resident pens book on postmortem collectibles

When Charles Miller was a boy, he and his grandmother often walked from her home to Floral Hill Cemetery where they would tend to family members' graves. There they would cut blades of stray grass from around headstones and wipe the dust from the grave markers.

After taking care of those chores, the young Miller was allowed to take off his shoes and socks and dip his feet into the pond at the cemetery, at least until he started kicking and splashing. When that started, his grandmother would gather up the tools of their task and the pair would begin the walk home.

Those early experiences, along with an early desire "to be an undertaker" and an interest in forensic science led the former Hoopeston resident to pen his eighth book, *Postmortem Collectibles*.

Published by Schiffer Publishing, Ltd., of Atglen, Penn., the book details not only how dealing

book details not only now dealing with death changed between the late 1800s and the 1960s but also how some people's fascination with dying has turned into a market for collectors. Postmortem Collectibles covers many topics, including caskets, vaults, items pertaining to the embalming procedure, cremation chambers, monuments, hearses,

funeral homes, burial garments, floral arrangements and postmortem photographs.

The photographs, most taken by professional photographers, show the deceased, often lying in a home, surrounded by flowers. Photographing a deceased person "was very popular during the turn of the century," Miller said. "It's a way of remembering a loved one." Photographing the dead was not from a sense of morbidity but instead was a way of keeping faraway relatives informed. Pictures were sent to friends and family unable to attend funeral services. The practice also provided closure for the living. "With a child's photograph, it's often the only thing you had left," Miller said.

Postmortem Collectibles contains more than 330 photographs in its 160 pages. Many of the items pictured are in Miller's collection, which includes about 1,100 postmortem photographs.



shops along with more modern methods of shopping, such as eBay.


Prices for postmortem photographs vary greatly. Miller's collection includes some picked up for \$5, while for others, he paid \$1,200. "The more rare and ornate they are, the costlier they are," he said.

The postmortem collection is another in a long line of Miller's interests, all involving history. Several of his interests have appeared in his other books. He has written three on the Jewel Tea Company of Chicago, one on the Rawleigh Company of Freeport, another on dimestore collectibles and one on kitchen, garden and housewares collectibles. His seventh book was a revision of the sold-out dimestore collectibles book.

Although *Postmortem Collectibles* is his most recent effort, the idea is something Miller wanted to see put in print for some time. "It took me eight years to talk my publisher into letting me do it," he said. "Of all eight, this is my baby."
