Absent aldermen delay vote on residential TIF development

Absent aldermen members delayed a decision Tuesday night on beginning residential development in Hoopeston's tax increment financing (TIF) area.

Council members Mike Eckersley and Nancy Stipp did not attend the meeting, delaying a vote on developing a residential complex in the TIF zone.

Although six aldermen were present, Mayor Chalmers Flint said five votes are needed to approve anything.

After an executive session lasting approximately 45 minutes, the council took no action on one reason given for the closed session, to discuss purchasing land.

The land under discussion is 65 acres east of Euclid, adjacent to the city's southeast side. The land, owned by Larry Petry, has been optioned by developer Jack Piper of Ohio, Ill.

Although often in TIF districts, developers purchase land directly from landowners, Alderman Bill Goodwine said municipalities may purchase land and hire their own developers.

Piper and Petry attended Tuesday's council meeting. Following the executive session, Piper spoke to aldermen about developing the land into salable lots.

The lots, which would sell for \$10,000 to \$12,000, would become sites for homes in the \$100,000 to \$125,000 range.

Tuesday's meeting was not the first time Piper has addressed the council. In December 1998, Piper told the council that preliminary projections called for 120 homes to be built over 10 to 12 years and that creating a special service area over the housing project would create additional revenue to build infrastructure.

At a Feb. 2, 1999 meeting, Goodwine suggested caution, saying Piper's Dec. 1, 1998 presentation did not match TIF information provided by the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs or the Illinois TIF Association.

Goodwine reiterated the need to be cautious after Tuesday's meeting.

Go-carts to be go, go, going in downtown Hoopeston Sunday

Up to 200 people are expected to be racing in downtown Hoopeston Sunday.

The Hoopeston Rotary Club will present the first SIRA Grand Prix Go Kart races beginning at 11 a. m., said Rotary president Ross Swartz. Races are expected to last until 6 p.m.

Downtown streets will be closed to create a racetrack. Main and Penn will each be closed between Third St. and Bank, Swartz said. Sawhorses will be placed approximately one-half block back from each intersection to help the flow of traffic, he added.

Practice laps will begin at 10:30, followed by a parade at 12:30 for the people who helped sponsor the races, Swartz said. Rotary members will sell ice cream and sweet corn during the day. The pit area will be the old railroad bed near NAPA. The pit area will be open to the public to give residents a chance to see the carts up close and talk to drivers, Swartz said.

Other towns which have sponsored races, such as Brazil, Ind., have been pleased with the event. "They've been pretty well received in the communities they've been in," Swartz said.

The race is being used as a fundraiser for the Rotary Club. Swartz said the club hopes to raise \$3,000 which will be put in a foundation to benefit Hoopeston, such as books for the literacy program and helping the Well Baby Clinic.
