

Cuts will come on two fronts, said Frank Caruso, CEO The potential loss of \$300,000 is "a challenge that is of Hoopeston Community Memorial Hospital. First, Gov. George Ryan has indicated he will cut Medicaid

Although figures for the hospital and nursing home were not immediately available, the budget for Hoopeston Regional Health Care, which also includes the Charlotte Ann Russell Medical Center and Country Terrace Apartments, is approximately \$9 million. Of that, Medicaid contributes about \$3.5 million.

Although the hospital measure has not been signed, Caruso said Ryan has indicated he will sign the legislation. Caruso expects the change to affect the hospital in a month or two.

getting a lower rate. However, he said, there are few other cuts that can be made. "Costwise, there is no fat in here to cut," he said.

To offset the potential losses, Caruso is asking the community to pull together as it did when Hoopeston was a finalist for a state prison, by lobbying state officials about the importance of the facilities to the community. State Rep. Bill Black and state Sen. Judy Myers are "fighting tooth and nail for us" but others are not so helpful. "There is no reality check there for legislators," Caruso said.

"The community needs to decide it wants the hospital, nursing home and physicians' clinic here and use them," he said. "If they don't use us, we won't be here."

It would not take many patients to offset the loss. Just two in-patients per day for the rest of the year would make up the difference, as would residents using local services, such as physical therapy, rather than going outside the community.

Recalling how the community pulled together for the prison, Caruso said the same thing needs to happen again. "We need help," he said. "We need support. We need that passion that everyone has to turn into commitment."

Caruso said he is aware of some residents' complaints about the hospital, but said many of those complaints are from years past. "We're not the same place we were eight years ago," he said. "We're not the same place we were four years ago. We're not perfect. I know it and I'm constantly reminded of it. But we're striving to be perfect."
