

Compton and his wife, Verna, recently opened Tater's Bar and Grill at 225 E. Main, formerly Compton's Bar & Grill. The Comptons, who named the business after their 10-yearold son, Tate, reopened after

made after reopening was to lower prices. "I've had a lot of comments about it already," he said. "I didn't make the prices we started and I thought some of them were kind of high."

Many things are the way they were. Monday is taco night at the restaurant, Friday is pork chop and rib eye night and on Saturday nights, prime rib is served. Compton also plans to serve catfish filets he began serving before the res-

taurant closed. "They sold like hotcakes," he said. During the summer, the kitchen will be open for

lunch from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 5-9 p.m. for dinner Mondays through Saturdays.

Compton is considering Sunday hours when the weather cools. "I think it will go over in the fall and winter but in the summer, there's too much going on," he said.

Bands and DJs will also be booked during cooler months.

Compton credits Community Bank, and especially bank president Bill Nicholls, with getting him back in business. "They went to bat for me and helped me out," Compton said. "If it wasn't for them, I probably wouldn't be here."

Nicholls was especially helpful, arranging for Compton to get a small business loan. "He did a good job," Compton said.



Other funding for the venture came from the city's revolving loan fund, which provided \$35,000 to be repaid over 10 years.

Since opening the doors about two weeks ago, residents have been coming in to eat and check things out. "People really come in and support me," Compton said.

One thing that may have helped is the dining area away from the bar. "People found out it's not just a bar," he said. "There's a bar on this side and a family side on the other side."

The business also has a banquet facility which may be rented seven days a week. Compton will also do catering.

Opening a business is not without risk but Compton said the risk is worth it. "I think Hoopeston needs (the restaurant and bar)," he said. "If people didn't go out and take a risk, Hoopeston would fold up and blow off the map. I was born and raised here and I don't want to see that happen."

Most days you'll find Compton in the kitchen, preparing the day's special and planning ahead. He will
