
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Hoopeston officials asked to consider ambulance tax hike

Hoopeston officials may consider another tax hike, this time to subsidize ambulance service.

At Tuesday's meeting, the council briefly discussed a request from Hoopeston Community Memorial Hospital CEO Frank Caruso that the city levy the maximum .25 ambulance tax, up from .137 now.

The increase would raise the amount received from \$41,000 to \$77,000, said Alderman Bill Goodwine.

Before the tax is raised, however, officials should consider other options, Goodwine said. "It's not a nobrainer by any means," he said. "There are some issues."

Those issues include \$36,000 the hospital originally wanted to manage the service but dropped from the contract and considering other ambulance services to oversee the Hoopeston service, said Alderman Don York, ambulance committee chairman.

The committee will meet with hospital personnel before making a decision on the request.

In other business, the council approved a professional services contract with Bloomington attorney Tom Ja-

cobs, who has been correcting mistakes in the city's tax increment financing (TIF) district. Jacobs has worked on the district for seven months without an agreement.

Under the agreement, Jacob's normal fee of \$195 per hour is cut to \$150. The contract calls for him to be paid \$10,000 for fixing problems in the existing TIF, \$15,000 to amend the agreement or draw up a new one and a fee to oversee the TIF for three years.

Jacobs said fixing problems in the TIF has already recouped far more than his fee for the city. He found 49 parcels of land that were annexed to the city but not on the tax rolls, estimated to bring in an additional \$46,000 to the TIF fund and \$4,000 to the city's general fund.

The TIF fund received \$95,000 in tax money this year. That amount is expected to increase to \$142,000 next year, including this year's shortfall, Jacobs said.

Goodwine voted against approving the contract with Jacobs, expressing concerns he heard from people knowledgeable about other TIF districts the attorney has worked with.

Rossville village officials worried over declining sales tax

ROSSVILLE—Decreasing sales tax has Rossville officials concerned not only about village income but also the effect on businesses.

A report on first quarter sales tax shows the village will receive more than \$6,900, said Mayor Terry Prillaman, estimated that the village will receive \$28,000 for the year. "I remember four or five years ago, it was around \$50,000," he said, adding that other taxes, such as motor fuel, are also "down, down down.

"I don't know the answer but I think we need to meet with the business owners and the merchants' association so see what we can do to help...if anything," he said.

Resident Mark Catron suggested the village "market

the whole town to the whole world" by developing a web page. Listing plusses of the village, Catron said the town has not marketed itself, especially to younger people who get much of their information from the Internet.

A committee comprised of trustees Kay Ritter and Vic Lackey, along with Prillaman and Catron, will meet with the business community to look at possible solutions.

In other business, trustees:

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
