U.S. Rep, residents discuss drugs, taxes, war at town meeting

Saying we've won the war in Iraq, U.S. Rep. Tim Johnson (IL-15) said Thursday the U.S. needs to bring its service men and women home quickly.

Johnson made his remarks Thursday in Hoopeston. The war hits close to

Johnson, whose chief-ofstaff Jerry Clark is serving in Baghdad as a fixed wing aircraft pilot.

"I supported us going in but now we need to extricate our troops as quickly and as wisely as we can," Johnson said. "I am anguished every day when I

To continue to keep American troops there to be shot at is unacceptable."

Johnson believes weapons of mass destruction will eventually be found in Iraq but "whether we do or don't, we deposed a brutal dictator and brought stability to the area," he said, adding the U.S. cannot continue to "police the world."

Johnson said Congress has been working on issues including a comprehensive energy policy that may be a boon for Illinois farmers.

The planned policy will cover not only fossil fuels but renewable energy sources, including ethanol, boosting production from 1.6 to 5 billion gallons required per vear. he said.

Johnson also discussed prescription coverage, saying the House recommends an optional plan that would include a deductible for participants, pay 75 to 80 percent to a certain dollar level and provide catastrophic coverage.

The House plan would help states such as Illinois which have a Circuit Breaker prescription program by shifting some of the costs from the states to the federal government.

The proposal would also help senior citizens. "It's unacceptable in a civilized country to have senior citizens - or any citizens for that matter - have to choose between breakfast and their prescription drugs," Johnson said.
