



## HA state report card shows improvement in test scores

Hoopeston Area students made great strides in improving their standardized test scores according to information presented at Thursday's district board meeting.

High school students taking the Prairie State Achievement Exam showed a nearly 10 percent increase in those meeting or exceeding state standards, from 39.8 in 2002 to 49.6 percent in 2003. "We improved in every single area we were tested in," said Principal Hank Hornbeck. Last year, the high school was placed on the academic warning list for low test scores. Placement on the list lasts for two years, so the school will still be on the list but according to the state, the school meets criteria under the federal No Child Left Behind Act and does not need

state intervention. Middle school students meeting or exceeding stan-

dards on the Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) jumped to 61.5 in 2003, from 53.2 in 2002.

Honeywell students improved their scores by five points, going from 63.4 percent last year to 68.4 percent this year meeting or exceeding standards.

At John Greer, those meeting or exceeding standards went from 55.2 percent to 67.6 percent at Maple, another 10-point jump was seen, to 82.9, up from 72.5 last vear.

The state level only saw a one percent increase, going to 61 percent, up from 60.1.

Official report cards were released for all schools in the district except John Greer. That school was one of more than 450 school erroneously placed on the "doesn't meet standards" list, said Superintendent Mark Conolly.

According to the Illinois State Board of Education website, some schools' data for student subgroups may have been tabulated incorrectly by an outside contractor who prepared district report cards. The state is working with the schools to correct the mistakes, according to the ISBE website.

Rossville-Alvin Elementary School and Mary Miller Elementary in the Georgetown-Ridge Farm district also made the list as did Northridge Middle School, Liberty and Southwest elementary schools and Northeast Elementary Magnet School, all in Danville. The list is available online at www.isbe.state.il.us.

Copies of the district report card are available at each building or online at the district's webpage, www.hoopeston.k12.il.us.

In unrelated business, board members are considering whether the district will ask that an advisory referendum be placed on the March primary ballot.

The referendum is being promoted by Lt. Gov. Pat Quinn and is for the Taxpayer Action Amendment for Education and Permanent Property Relief. Under the proposal, the state's wealthiest tax payers - those with an adjusted gross income of \$250,000 or more, would pay a three percent surtax, estimated at generating \$1.15 billion. The tax would be added on top of Illinois' three percent tax on those reporting more than \$250,000 in income. 
