Editor's Note: Mid-January is historically the time when winter storms cause school closings, according to Hoopeston Area Superintendent Mark Conolly. This article is reprinted from an earlier interview with Conolly in which he discusses how

parents and students can prepare for school closings.

The start of the holiday season means a potential for winter storms and the possibility for school closings.

Winter presents a unique set of challenges, said Superintendent. Mark Conolly. A storm may prompt closing of school during the

day and students-and parents-should be prepared.

Conolly suggested parents make sure their children are dressed warmly in case they must walk home from school and that families develop a contingency plan should school be dismissed while parents are at work. Conolly suggested the plan might include a secondary place for children to go should they be unable to get into their homes in case of an early dismissal. "Our fear is not the child who is on the bus and warm but the one who has to walk across town who might find no one at home," he said.

Weather-related closings during the school day take at least one hour of preparation time, Conolly said. In that time, police departments are notified, as are local factories and radio and television stations, all before children are dismissed.

Days in which school is cancelled before school starts are no less active. Conolly and transportation director Darrell Brown often travel country roads to

> mula for closing school. "There are no definitive criteria," Conolly said. "We do the best we can with the information we have available."

is on the bus and warm but Once the decision has been made to cancel classes, calls again go out to police, factories and across town who might find media, including WHPO, WIAI, WITY and WGFA radio stations and television stations WICD, Supt. Mark Conolly Channel 15 and WCIA Channel 3.

Conolly said he tries to make his decision before 6 a.m. so it may be broadcast on news programs.

While many things go into deciding if school should be closed, some things do not. Each district is allowed five snow days annually. Days missed during the year must be made up at the end of the year "but that never comes into play when you're considering a safety issue," Conolly said.

Missed state aid for closing school is also not considered, simply because it is not an issue, he said. The amount received for state aid is not based on day-today attendance but on the three best months of attendance, traditionally September, October and November.

There are always some more adversely affected by bad weather. "We always have at least one person whose lane has drifted closed," Conolly said. Then it is the parent's call. "If they feel because of weather conditions that it's a more judicious decision to keep their child at home then by all means, they should
