Local Army Captain tells of division, conditions of soldiers in Operation Iraqi Freedom

Captain, plants to write columns monthly to let people know how and what our soldiers are doing in Iraq.

We are proud members of the oldest continuously serving division in the United States Army....we are the 1st Infantry Division also known as the Big Red One. We have kept our na-

tion safe, making the selfless sacrifice to preserve freedom since 1917. From General Pershing in Cantigny, to rebuilding nations in the Balkans, the First Infantry Division was there. Once again, we are being entrusted with another mission...Operation Iraqi Freedom II under the command of Major General John R. Batiste.

My name is Captain Brock A. Zimmerman, a 1996 graduate of Hoopeston Area High School. Over the next year, I will be writing columns once a month to inform people back home on the events occurring in Iraq, military life for soldiers, and overviews of the types of operations that have been conducted in our area of operation. All information provided will be unbiased and opinions reflect only of me. All information will have passed through our military intelligence to ensure that our operational security has not been breached. If there are any questions that anyone would want to get answered, one can contact Linda Zimmerman for my contact information.

The 2nd Battalion 63rd Armored Regiment (2-63 AR), command by Lieutenant Colonel Jeffrey J. Kulp landed onto Kuwaiti soil on February 14, 2004 to assume a twelve to fourteen month mission in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom II. Recently, 2-63AR just completed a nine month rotation in Balkans in support of Operation Joint Guardian and returned to Vilseck, Germany in July 2003. From July to mid-January, time has elapsed quickly. Single, married soldiers and families spent time to get reintegrated from the previous deployment in Balkans

only to say goodbye to loved ones for another deployment. Training has been intense and extensive, ranging from convoy live fire exercises (shooting

> from moving vehicles), machine gun ranges, tank qualification, close quarters combat, a thirty day training exercise in Hohenfels, Germany and preparing vehicles and other related equipment for the long awaited deployment.

> Currently we are sitting in the middle of a desert awaiting our equipment to arrive at the port.

Once our equipment has been off-loaded, we will take a bus to the port and drive our vehicles through Kuwait to our Forward Operating Base (FOB) Camp New York which is just shy of the Iraqi border. There are currently over 11,000 soldiers and Marines on this base. All the soldiers here are awaiting onward movement to Iraq to smaller FOB's. There is one main dining facility and two fast food facilities to accommodate all of us. Some soldiers elect to eat the meals ready to eat (MRE) rather than waiting in line for over an hour to get mediocre chow. There is also a Post Exchange (PX) where soldiers can buy things anything from miniature DVD players to shaving cream. However to get these items, one will patiently wait in line for a good four to five hours. There is also a phone center that has approximately 20-25 phones. Specialist (SPC) Andy Cade and Sergeant (SGT) Brandon Shuler, both of Hoopeston, from the 1st Cavalry Division stationed out of Ft. Hood Texas will utilize the same camp after we depart for the Iraq border.

Living conditions are cramped. We are sleeping sixty to sixty-three men in a tent made for fifty. Ventilation is a problem and it seems as everyone has a cold or a nagging cough. A lot of this is also caused by the sudden weather change from cold Germany to genuinely warm Kuwait. The wind stirs up the desolate desert dust creating sand storms and other problems. Believe it or not but it is actually cold in the desert at night. There is no wind block and the air is piercing.

Morale is high. The men are focused and are ready to assume the mission. Many say, "The sooner we start, the sooner we go back home." Many military soldiers were affected by the Army's stop loss and stop movement program, which means that soldiers are not allowed to leave the Army (stop loss) or move to another duty assignment even though their time was completed at that duty station (stop move). Everyone is eager, but everyone understands the dangers that we
