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Downtown brawl leads to arrests for mob action, hate crimes

Five people were charged with aggravated battery, mob action and committing a hate crime after a fight Saturday in the 100 block of South Bank St.

Arrested were Marcus A. Burke, 20, of 616 N. Kimball, Danville and Hoopeston residents Bradley H. Calloway, 17, of 316 E. Elm; Beau J. Edwards, 24, of 816 E. Seminary; Joshua J. Edwards, 26, of 816 E. Main; and Tonya K. Irvin, 27, of 309 W. Penn.

According to police reports, two of the four men were seen fighting at about 3:42 p.m. on Bank.

The other two men then joined the altercation, as did numerous others.

Off-duty Hoopeston police arrived to help on-duty officers and at one point during the fracas, at least one Hoopeston officer had drawn his weapon. County and state police also responded to assist.

Burke and Calloway were taken into custody at the scene without incident but the others fled.

Joshua Edwards was apprehended in the 400 block of East Seminary after leading police on a foot chase through nearby yards. Beau Edwards and Irvin were arrested at an unspecified location.

History made as Miss Hoopeston resigns, new one named

For the first time in 56 years, the woman chosen to be Miss Hoopeston has resigned.

Brittany Buss, who was chosen Miss Hoopeston, resigned on March 19, said Michelle Gonzalez, 2004 chairman of the National Sweetcorn Festival.

Buss' resignation and the coronation of a new Miss Hoopeston were announced at a press conference Saturday.

"To our knowledge, this is the first Miss Hoopeston that ever resigned her crown," Gonzalez said, adding that Buss resigned for personal reasons that would not allow her to fulfill a commitment to her one-year reign.

First runner up Anna Reutter was named the new Miss Hoopeston.

Reutter, 19, graduated Hoopeston Area High School in 1993 and currently attends Illinois State Uni-

Rossville, Hoopeston schools similar

The recent findings of the feasibility study for North Vermilion County schools have lead to many discussions lately and prompted me as a parent to compare the results from the 2002-03 reports compiled by the Illinois State Board of Education.

In reviewing the school district report cards for the 2002-03 school years for Rossville-Alvin, Hoopeston-Area and Bismarck school districts, I found some interesting statistics. The school report card states that the low income rate for students in that year were as follows:

Bismarck - Henning - 16.5%
Hoopeston Area - 43.9%
Rossville - Alvin - 42%

Now, if my math serves me correctly - this shows that Rossville-Alvin and Hoopeston Area are virtually the same economically. If a reason for continuing discussions with Bismarck is that the two have more in common economically - it is wrong. Speaking of economics, how many people from Bismarck drive up to Rossville to use businesses and services? On the other hand, Hoopeston residents drive through Rossville regularly to get to work. Has the fact been considered that businesses on the north end of the county could be alienated should Rossville choose to go south?

Class size has been a big issue for parents of Rossville. The 2003 report card shows 5 out of 6

of the class sizes reported were smaller in Hoopeston than in Bismarck. Class size should be an important issue for parents.

The percent of students who are meeting or exceeding the Illinois Learning Standards for each district in 2003 are as follows:

Bismarck Henning - 69.7%
Rossville - Alvin - 69.7%
Hoopeston Area - 64.6%

There aren't significant differences in test averages.

The tax rate in Hoopeston is lower, the bus trip

is shorter and the Hoopeston Area Board of Education has made several statements declaring they would like to do what is best for the future of all students in the northern part of the county. The facts
