Business people met Tuesday to discuss problems, concerns and possible solutions. Problems discussed included dogs in the downtown area, people blocking entryways to businesses, a lack of signs on Rtes. 1 and 9 directing potential shoppers to the downtown.

Dogs in the downtown are a major problem, according to merchants there. "If my eight-year-old can't ride her bike on Main St., then people shouldn't walk their dogs on Main St., said Kathleen Margevich of The Academy for the Performing Arts. "I'm going to do whatever I have to do to get dogs banned on Main St."

Margevich complained of dogs scaring people dropping off and picking up her students and other merchants said dog owners do not clean up dog feces left on the sidewalks in front of stores.

As for people gathering in front of businesses, Hoopeston Police Chief Mark Drollinger said violators may be charged with illegally blocking sidewalks or illegal trespassing. He urged merchants to call police when violations occur, sign complaints and testify in court.

Prompt notification to police is a key point, Drollinger said. "A half hour after the fact hurts us," he said. "Call when you see suspected activity."

The police department will have an increased presence in the business district, Drollinger said, adding that last weekend, three Vermilion County deputies were also in the city. "That show of force, along with our own officers, went a long way," he said.

The group also discussed the appearance of the downtown, including plywood-covered windows in buildings. Most of the group would like to see more uniformity in the downtown, whether it be putting up flower baskets similar to those at the Lorraine Theatre, or having awnings or some other decorative touch that would pull the appearance of the buildings together.

Mayor Chalmers Flint agreed that signs are needed on Rtes. 1 and 9 to draw people to the downtown. A committee, including Ed Hubbard of Hoopeston Books & Gifts, Jean Minick of Lester's, and Lourdine Florek of Just the Facts, volunteered to work with the city's civic improvement committee, headed by Alderman Nancy Stipp, to come up with possible solutions.

Hubbard said one of the city's main problems is that "980% of Hoopeston talks down about Hoopeston. Hubbard praised the city's good people, highlytrained workers and good schools but said residents speak disparagingly about the city. When he opened his business, Hubbard said, people told him "I don't have a bat's chance in hell" of succeeding. "People should be proud of this city," he said.

Merchants discussed the need for a name and logo for the organization and agreed to have a city-wide contest. Entries may be taken to Unger's Jewelry and The Chronicle by May 3. The creator of the winning name and logo will receive \$50, donated by Ray Williams, owner of the former Der Schreiner building.

The group also elected officers, including Steve Unger of Unger's Jewelry, chairman; Joyce Allen, Allen Accounting/H&R Block, secretary; and Gary Shore, First Allied Securities and Jeff Keith, Hoopeston Books & Gifts, vice-chairs.

The group will meet the second Tuesday of each month at the Methodist Church, 403 E. Main. All Hoopeston business owners are invited to attend the meetings.
