An African American man was the target of a cross-burning incident late Sunday or early Monday.

J.R. Nation of 610 E. Young, looked out his window Monday morning to find a makeshift cross had been burned in his front yard.

The cross, made from branches and covered in cloth, was apparently soaked in an accelerant before it was lit.

At first, Nation said, he thought neighbors might have built a stand to set off fireworks. It was only on closer inspection that he found the racially-charged symbol.

Nation said he gathered the cross and other pieces of evidence and took them to the Hoopeston Police Department. Chief Mark Drollinger said Tuesday that the incident is under investigation. "It's unfortunate that something like this happened in this day," he said.

Nation, too, believes the incident is unfortunate but it is not the first time he has experienced racism since moving to Hoopeston in 1996.

On some occasions, Nation said he has been called "nigger" by passersby as he has ridden his bicycle in the city. He has had items stolen from around his home and has received phone calls using the same epithet and accusing him of "taking away our work."

Nation is semi-retired and operates his own business doing construction, landscaping and other home improvement services.

"I've heard that "N" word used more in Hoopeston than I ever had before, except when I was a little boy," he said. "I try to ignore (the racial slurs) because I'm bigger than that," he said. When called names, "I

Proposed swimming pool ordinance beached for questions

A proposed swimming pool ordinance based on a similar law in Danville was tabled by the Hoopeston City Council Tuesday night to allow time to gather more information.

The suggested ordinance would cover all facets of swimming pools from electrical to installation, chlorination to filtration, said city attorney Bill Nelson. "It's like a building code for a swimming pool," he said.

Mayor Chalmers Flint said the idea of an ordinance came because of concerns about stagnant water breeding mosquitoes and because of child safety.

Some aldermen questioned the sample ordinance. "There are a lot of things in there I don't agree with," said Alderman Rod Kaag. For example, he said, "Chief (Mark) Drollinger just bought a set of steps that are in violation of this ordinance."

Aldermen will review the suggested ordinance

and are expected to discuss it again at the July 20 meeting.



A pit bull was killed by a Hoopeston Police officer Monday after it and a boxer chased a child and killed a cat.

The incident began at 5:55 a.m. in the 500 block of North Third St., when police received the call. The dogs took off, followed by officers who wanted to insure that they did not bite anyone and try to guide them home, said Chief Mark Drollinger. In an alley between Thompson and McCracken, the pit bull lunged at an officer, who fired once, killing the dog.
