Township officials approve compromise salary increases

Grant Township officials elected in April will receive higher wages after trustees approved a compromise increase Tuesday.

A suggested increase following the raise Vermilion County workers received - three percent the first year, 2.5 percent the second year and three percent the third and fourth years - was defeated in a 3-2 vote. Supervisor Bill Boose and trustee Connie Wilson voted for that increase, with Steve Willard, Dale Lithgow and Rich Thompson voting against it.

"Based on economic times, I think we're sending the wrong message," Lithgow said before the vote. "I think the county sent the wrong message, too."

Willard then suggested a midpoint between the county's raise and six percent. "I think everybody deserves a raise but I don't think we can do the whole thing," he said.

Willard's motion passed unanimously.

The action means the supervisor will receive \$27,610 the first of the four years and \$29,430 in the last year. The highway commissioner salary range will be \$22,640-\$36,053 and for the assessor, the range will be \$28,610-\$30,430.

Salaries for town clerk and trustees will remain at \$3,100 and \$1,200 annually.

Over four years, the total difference between the two packages for all employees is \$10,157 which, Lithgow said, is about enough to fund the township's youth and senior citizen programs.

Finance committee approves criteria for giving away building

Hoopeston's finance committee has developed guidelines under which it will give the Willdon Building to a company.

The committee met Tuesday to review suggested criteria to donate the building which is being advertised nationally as free to a company that will provide jobs in the city.

The number of jobs a company will provide will be the primary consideration, along with the pay rate. Alderman Bill Goodwine, finance committee chairman, said the pay rate should be enough to attract new people to Hoopeston.

Officials hope to lure a company with a good track record, experience in its industry and a good reputation.

The committee, which also includes alder-

men Brandon Hamilton and Kevin Davis, agreed that Nov. 30 is the target cutoff date for interested companies to view the building; however, exceptions may be made if special circumstances arise.

Goodwine urged that officials be somewhat skeptical of respondents who are primarily interested in the free building. "The free building was to catch their eye," he said adding the city wants to position itself as an alternative to moving jobs to Asia.

Goodwine reiterated the need to court those companies the city is interested in seeing in the building, including picking up company representatives at the airport if they desire and having them meet with community leaders.

At the October 5 Hoopeston City Council meeting,

Goodwine volunteered to pick up representatives of interested companies from airports and since then, he said, other community leaders have expressed willingness to do the same.

The Willdon Building has been advertised in Crane Chicago Business and the Wall Street Journal. It was the Journal advertisement that generated responses - approximately 15 to date - and prompted the Associated Press to write a story about Hoopeston and its free building.
