Alderman John Haughee will resign April 30. Haughee announced his resignation at Tuesday night's

Hoopeston City Council meeting. In a letter to the council and mayor, Haughee said the date marks the midpoint of

his seventh term and his 26th consecutive year as Ward 2 alderman.

"I've been concerned about this matter for some time," Haughee told the council. After marrying and moving to Indiana last year, Haughee said he planned to spend four days each week in Hoopeston but that some weeks, he has been unable to fulfill that goal.

Indicating that Mayor Chalmers Flint had addressed the issue with him, Haughee said residency requirements are "a hazy area" because he still owns property and pays taxes in Hoopeston and still has furniture at his home. However, after evaluating the situation, "it was time to make that decision," he said.

Praising Haughee for his dedication, Flint said he agreed with the decision. "It's only fair," he said. "I agree because we had some concerns there."

In waiting until the end of April, Haughee said the mayor elected April 5 will be able to select his replacement.

Aldermen were hesitant to accept Haughee's resignation. Rod Kaag made the motion. "I don't want to but I think we have to," he said. Alderman Kevin Davis voted against accepting Haughee's resignation.

Davis was also the sole dissenting vote in accepting the resignation of city attorney Bill Nelson.

Nelson, in a letter to the council, stated his last day will be March 1.

The board then unanimously appointed Brian Manion as new city attorney. Manion,

who practices with his

father, Paul, received his law license Nov. 4, 2004 after graduating from Southern Illinois University College of Law.. He is a 1997 graduate of Hoopeston Area High School and received his bachelor of science degree in finance from the University of Illinois in 2001.

The coffee drinkers have an official shelf, made by one of the members, to hold their morning mugs. Nearly all the coffee drinkers have a cup


