Incumbent, three challengers vie for Hoopeston mayor's seat

All four candidates seeking the top spot in Hoopeston government agree that jobs and economic development are among the top issues facing the city. Candidates and their platforms include:

Russell "Drew" Allen, 63, a lifelong Hoopeston resident.

Allen attended East Lynn High School and Wayland Baptist College. He is retired from Stokely's and served as Ward 3 alderman for 10 years.

Assets Allen will bring to the job include city government experience, management and communications

skills and wastewater management and engineering experience.

Priorities for Hoopeston include finding businesses, fixing the flooding problem on the city's north side and improving the downtown.

Allen said he has been working with organizing a planning committee to bring businesses to the city; has a workable solution to Front St. flooding; and is working with Hoopeston First to make the downtown more appealing.

Bill DeWitt, 76, a retired Stokely's farm superintendent and auctioneer.

DeWitt said assets he will bring to the position include "my determination to work energetically on all phases of community development."

Issues facing Hoopeston include limited employment, storm water drainage and empty homes and buildings.

DeWitt said he would approach small busi-

nesses - with 25-45 employees - to locate in Hoopeston and pursue the possibility of a factory locating here.

As for storm drainage, DeWitt said by getting financial help from other sources, Hoopeston can replace old sewers, clean out others and ease the problem, if not totally correct it. An adequate outlet for storm water is needed, he said.

Bringing employment to the city would help solve the abundance of empty buildings, as new families move to Hoopeston, thereby helping the school system.

"I'm a real people person," DeWitt said. "I talk

to everyone and they talk to me. If you don't know what people think, you wont be able to represent them."

Chalmers Flint. 66, a 25-year Hoopeston resident and retired teacher and principal.

Flint, a former Hoopeston city clerk, was elected mayor in 2001. Flint had planned to be a one-term mayor but decided to seek

reelection to "finish projects that I thought I would have finished the first four years," he said. "Because there are so many parties involved in various projects citywide, it takes longer to complete these projects than I had planned."

Employment opportunities, new housing and more retail businesses are Flint's top priorities, along with finding a motel for Hoopeston.

If reelected, Flint said he will keep in touch with various government agencies and real estate developers, as well as attending conferences, to help economic development.



Model train buffs to hold weekend whistle stop at civic center

Train wheels will be turning and smoke curling at the McFerren Park Civic Center this weekend - at least on a small scale.

The civic center will be the site of Hoopeston's first model train show, sponsored by the Hoopeston Chamber of Commerce and organized by Lenard Compton.

The show will be held from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Sunday. Admission is free and door prizes will be awarded.

The idea for the show came after Compton, a model train fan, realized there were no events in the local area for collectors. "There are no major train shows for 100 miles," he said, adding that shows are usually held in larger venues such as Springfield, Decatur and Terre Haute and Lafayette, Ind.

The Hoopeston area has several people who are into model trains. "They don't have time to go to shows so we're bringing the show to them," he said.

Compton's interest in trains began about six years ago as an activity to share with his grandchildren. It quickly grew from a hobby into a passion. His layout -

Former resident pleads guilty

JACKSONVILLE, Fla.—A former Hoopeston man has pleaded guilty to charges stemming from an Aug. 4, 2004, incident in which he took a lawyer hostage and threatened to blow up a building.

In a plea agreement, John Knight, 36, pleaded guilty last week to false imprisonment, aggravated assault, carrying a concealed weapon and perpetrating a bomb hoax, according to the Florida Times-Union. Under the agreement, Knight will be sentenced June 2 to between 5 and 20 years in prison.

Knight was angry because of a 1999 domestic violence case where he received a one-day jail sentence and fine. He pleaded no contest to a fighting charge.

News sources reported in August that Knight entered an office building, showed a homemade badge identifying him as a law enforcement officer and threatened an attorney with a gun.

The judge involved in the domestic violence
