While still projecting a deficit, a tentative "worst case scenario" budget approved by the Hoopeston Area but ended about \$100,000 in the red. School Board on Thursday is not as bad as previous The board approved the tentative budget with an esti-

mated deficit of \$90,000 after projected revenues of \$9,670,000 and expenses of \$9,760,000.

"Sometimes we get criticized for our "worst case scenario" budgets," said board president Steve Unger. "I've been on the board 10 years. Nine we've had pleasant surprises and one year not so pleasant but I'm glad we budgeted for it."

The budget is tentative because the district and Hoopeston Education Association are still negotiating the teacher contract. The approved budget includes an undisclosed salary hike but the final budget will depend on the accepted contract, said Superintendent Mark Conolly.

The decreased deficit is good news for the district, which got a shot in the arm from a 90 cent referendum for the education fund approved last November. The referendum was expected to generate \$600,000 but due to increases in property tax exemptions, will net about \$400,000, Conolly said.

Despite that loss, "in this budget, if we can duplicate what we did last year, we should end up in the black," he said.
