Rossville village board bans all but landscape waste burning

ROSSVILLE—In a move designed to make the village more appealing to new residents, the Rossville Village Board has burned banning everything but landscape waste.

In a 5-1 vote, the board voted Monday night to ban burning paper - the only other substance that was allowed to be burned - as an amendment to the existing ordinance on burning.

Under the new rule, which becomes effective Nov. 15, only landscape waste, including leaves, branches and grass clippings, may be burned. Those items must be burned in the open, however, because the amendment also bans burn barrels in the village.

Before the vote, two residents spoke on the issue. Nancy Dickison, who moved to Rossville from Danville, asked the board to veto the ban, in part because Danville kept adding ordinances that took away "individual rights and freedoms more and more. I hate to see the village of Rossville following big cities and doing what they're doing," she said. "The best government is the least government. This little village doesn't need big city laws." Speaking on the opposite side was resident Gene Hughes. "I think it's just a matter of time before someone insists, through legal action, that this be done," he said. "I don't like to give up rights but if we're going to live in a structured society, you have to have rules."

Rossville's future, he said, depends on getting new residents, including retirees from the Chicago area and the burning ban will appeal to them. Besides, he added, "you're no more than confirming that the state law already exists."

The change puts Rossville in compliance with the state's burning ban.

In voting, trustee Richard Birkey was the sole dissenting vote.

In unrelated business, residents will be paying higher gas prices this month.

Trustee Scott Sprague, gas committee chairman, said last month's cost to residents of 92 cents per therm is going up to \$1.025 per therm this month.

Mayor Terry Prillaman said prices could rise even more as the temperature drops. "I've seen projections See ROSSVILLE on other side

Hoopeston Area parent/teacher conferences set Oct. 27, 28

Any parent or guardian who cannot arrange their


schedule to attend during the scheduled times are urged to call their child's respective school and arrange an alternate time for a conference.


There will be no student attendance on Oct. 28.

that it could run \$1.30-\$1.35 per therm," he said.

Increased cost to the village means the gas committee will review the amount charged for its budget billing program and that customers who now want to enroll in the program will be put on a six-month cycle rather than 12 months to accommodate price increases.

In unrelated action, the board:

• approved Birkey's resignation, effective immediately. Birkey cited health reasons for the resignation.

• Set trick-or-treat hours as 5:30-8 p.m. Monday, Oct. 31. The event is for children ages preschool-12. Residents who wish to give treats are asked to leave their porch lights on.

• approved straightening an alley off Chicago St. near that runs to Dr. Jon Satterwhite's office. The request was made by Harold and Juanita Fritz who plan to open a restaurant and use alley access to a drive-through.

• took no action on a plan to raise water rates to be eligible for state grants for upgrades to the water treatment plant.

"Is it possible to hold off on water because we know gas is going up," asked trustee Richard Queen, water committee chairman.

Prillaman replied that rates must be increased by January. The water committee will review hikes suggested in a consulting report.

• approved declaring \$55,178 in Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds as surplus. The money will be distributed to taxing bodies under an intergovernmental agreement.

• voted down a requested ordinance from Prillaman to borrow \$159,580 from the village gas fund to pay for work done readying property in the new subdivision.
