 City leaders hear of area economic development assistance

Economic development in the modern world has to be thought of in local and larger terms, according to two area experts in the field.

Vicki Haugen, president and CEO of Vermilion Advantage and Todd Lee, East Central Region Manger for the Illinois Department of Commerce & Economic Opportunity, were keynote speakers at a meeting of community leaders Wednesday evening.

The event was sponsored by the Hoopeston Chamber of Commerce economic development committee.

Lee, who oversees the state Opportunity Returns program locally, said Opportunity returns was started because "the 'one-size fits all' approach coming from Springfield and Chicago didn't fit the Hoopestons, the Rossvilles, the East Lynns" of the state.

Opportunity Returns uses local leaders to meet with community leaders and determine the type of economic development would work best in each region.

Economic development "is the most important thing," Lee said. "It's the heartbeat that makes your

communities tick." Lee compared economic development to a road worker who, on the first day of his job, painted a line

three miles long. The second day, he painted a line 1.5 miles long and on the third day, the line was only a half mile long. When asked why he painted less each day, the worker replied that he was getting further and further away from the paint can. "I'm trying to bring the paint can to you," Lee said.

One of the big things that needs to change in Vermilion County is the attitude of its citizens, he said. "I think our part of the world is a great place to raise families" he

> said, adding "Hoopeston is big enough to have city amenities but small enough to have small-town charm."

Dick Read, a member of the economic development committee, said he recently spoke with someone who was interested in locating a business in Hoopeston but was concerned about the negative attitude expressed by some residents.

While many people worry that local young people don't return after graduation from college, Lee suggested it is more important for them to return when they decide to settle down and raise families.

and Haugen said the biggest percentage of new jobs come from companies already existing in communities. A study of Vermilion County job expansion shows that approximately two-thirds of all new jobs created in the last 15 years came from companies already established in the county, Haugen said.

Existing businesses know the community and are often strong supporters. Lee talked about Silgan Containers, which worked with Vermilion Advantage on a \$2 million job expansion program. The company looked at other options, including evaluation of the company's other Midwest facilities. "It was the work ethic of people in Hoopeston, Ill. that could not be matched by their facilities in other communities," Lee said.

Encouraging and helping existing companies to grow is easier than attracting new companies because the site selection process "is really a process of elimination," Haugen said.

Companies develop minimum standards and want to see information only on sites that meet those standards. And the standards have changed significantly over Haugen's career. The average size building now requested is 150,000 sq. ft. "I can remember a time when it was less than 50," she said.

The number of needed acres has also risen, to an average of 158, far exceeding Hoopeston's primary commercial site, the Hoopeston Industrial Corporation's 30 acre site on Rt. 9.

Vermilion County has access to resources to help existing and new businesses, including the Danville Area
