Rossville board of trustees approves Casey's General Store

ROSSVILLE—The familiar red and yellow of Casey's General Stores will be seen in Rossville after the village board gave the green light to the company Friday.

At a special board meeting Friday afternoon, trustees unanimously approved a recommendation made by the village zoning board Thursday, allowing Casey's to build a store on the vacant lot at Chicago and Attica.

The lot was made vacant by a February 27, 2004 fire that swept through the 100 block of South Chicago.

The new store will be 40'x 68' or 2,720 sq. ft., said Joni Dyar, real estate/store development associate. The business will include four gas pumps capable of serving eight vehicles at one time and will be open 6 a.m.-112 p.m. seven days a week. Two handicapped-accessible restrooms will be included. The average cost of a new store is \$850,000, Dyar said.

A local person is expected to be hired as store manager. "They know the town," Dyar said. "They know the

HA phases in new math classes to meet state requirements

Hoopeston Area students will soon be taking additional courses to meet increased state requirements.

At Thursday's regular board meeting, high school principal Hank Hornbeck said students must currently have four semesters of math and six semesters of English as part of the 48 credits required for graduation.

Under new state requirements, students who graduate in 2009 and after will need six semesters of math, including algebra and geometry, and those graduating in 2012 and later will need eight semesters of English.

Hornbeck said the math curriculum is being expanded to help students meet the new requirements. Currently, algebra, algebra II, tech math, advanced math, advanced math II and geometry are offered. This year, one section of pre-algebra was added, with more sections likely next year, when applied geometry will also be offered.

Pre-algebra will not count as the algebra requirement but will be considered in the total required math. Also, he said, tech math will not be needed and will be phased out.

In other business, the board:

• Learned the board negotiating committee met with members of the Hoopeston Education Association to begin work on a new contract. Last year, the sides agreed to a one-year deal which expires at the end of summer.

- Heard from Superintendent Mark Conolly that the district will upgrade computers as finances allow. Currently, Hoopeston Area has 454 computers, two thirds of which are Pentium 2 machines at least seven years old. Upgrades will be to Pentium 4 machines, estimated to cost \$1,000 each with needed software.
- Also heard from Conolly that state officials will allow cooperative high schools as a form of consolidation with state financial incentives. That is good news for Catlin, Oakwood and Jamaica schools, he said.
- Heard from Hornbeck about a proposed cooperative with Rossville-Alvin for middle school baseball. John Zollar, representing Rossville-Alvin, said he is "real excited. I think it can be a real positive step for all of the kids."
- Heard from a parent about her children being hit in school. She and Hornbeck are to meet to work out a solution.
- \bullet Saw students modeling new black and blue band uni-
