Is it possible to have someone such as the Peace Corps person make the initial contact, as I have no idea on how to contact her. Hopefully the historic people would have a representative to come out and give the building an evaluation, and possible a plan for what the best options for the building as well the city are!

What about CRIS Senior Center? They worked long and hard to obtain the former Holland Building in Danville with the plans to turn it into a multiuse facility, as well with residential occupancy for disabled individuals. I realize that this would take much more infrastructure work as the Willdon was never set up as a residential complex, plus there might be some residential placement ordinances that need to be looked into, but it is a sturdy, beautiful, and sound building, with a long history that should still be having life flow through its doors on a daily basis.

I fear that this building will fall into disrepair over the years, and one day the citizens of Hoopeston will be faced with an enormous demolition and another empty place where one of our most beautiful buildings once stood.

Everyone that has any thoughts no matter how outlandish should try to get their voices heard as to save this structure. I have been told that an unoccupied building

disintegrates faster than if it were being used, due to a multitude of physical factors, air flow in and out, temperature, humidity regulation, and observations of the occupancy when repairs need to be made - this is what keeps a building alive.

To simply "mothball" the structure is unfortunately what we must do I have been told but hopefully only in the short term!
