County health department begins checking for West Nile

Vermilion County Health Department is beginning surveillance to identify West Nile virus. Environmental Health Director Kolby Riggle said birds are often the early warning system to identify the presence of West Nile-infected birds and the mosquitoes that carry the virus.

The health department is accepting dead birds for testing by the state. "If the state identifies West Nile Virus in a dead bird that is tested, then we know that the virus may be in the community," Riggle said. Mosquitoes

become infected with West Nile virus when they feed on infected birds. Infected mosquitoes can then transmit the virus to humans and to other birds and animals when biting occurs.

Only 10 birds will be allowed for testing. Perching birds such as crows, blue jays, grackles, starlings, sparrows, finches, robins, cardinals, flycatchers, swallows, catbirds, mockingbirds, warblers and wrens may be accepted. The health department will accept birds for testing that show no obvious cause of death, that are not decomposed and that have not been damaged by scavenging animals. "If anyone finds a dead bird that they believe may fit the criteria, they should call us for further directions," Riggle said.

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, people get West Nile disease from the bite of a mosquito that is infected with the virus. It is not spread by personto-person contact or directly from birds to people.

WNV arrived in the state during the summer of 2001. By 2002, IDPH was reporting 884 human cases of WNV across the state; three in Vermilion County. In 2005, there were 252 cases of the virus in Illinois (none were identified in Vermilion County last year). Most people (80%) bitten by an infected mosquito will not show symptoms, other than a mild illness, including fever and headache. About one in 150 people infected will develop severe illness including fever, headache, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness, vision loss, numbness and paralysis. Risk is increased for those over age 50. Anyone with chronic health conditions is most at risk.
