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Township officials struggle with environmental authority

Which organization had the authority to comment on the environmental condition of the old township garage is something Grant Township officials are trying to figure out.

At the board's regular meeting last Tuesday, road commissioner Gary Weinard said some confusion exists over which agency, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency or Illinois State Fire Marshall's Office, had the authority to give a green light to the property after underground fuel storage tanks were removed in 1998.

Danner Construction of Rossville removed the tanks, Weinard said, adding that an Illinois Fire Marshall's report said there were no apparent leaks or contamination. Soil samples were taken then and sent to a laboratory that subsequently closed, leaving no trail of the

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



Officials would like to have a No Further Remediation letter from the state EPA before selling the property but the EPA will not issue a letter based on Illinois Fire Marshall's documentation, Weinard said.

The tanks were removed at a time when control of such issues was shifting from the fire marshall's office to the EPA, he added.

Without a letter from the EPA, potential buyers will not be able to receive a mortgage on the property, said township attorney Bill Nelson.

The property, at 702 E. Orange, is expected to be sold

in the near future after a new township garage was built. Prior to the sale, the board must approve a resolution that includes the size of the property, zoning, terms of the sale and may include that the township is selling the property without an IEPA NFR letter, Nelson said.

Before it is sold, the property must be appraised and the selling price must be 80 percent or more of the appraised value, he added.

Weinard also told trustees that Thompson Ave. to Chenevville will be resurfaced by the county, then turned over to the township, adding about three miles to township roads.
