

FMC is one of eight buildings which have been donated SeedAmerica. Others are in Ohio, Indiana, Alabama, Massachusetts and Wisconsin. Of those, half are occupied, one fully.

Zimmerman said SeedAmerica is willing to take changes on businesses, such as start-ups, that might otherwise have difficulty finding a home. A committee looks at a prospective company's finances "but we don't scrutinize them to death," he said. "Lots of people wouldn't take a chance of them. We will. Are we going to win every time? No but I think we'll win more than we lose."

Company officials picked "Seed" as part of the name because "we want buildings all over the country," Zimmerman said. The idea for the organization came after founders noticed a trend. SeedAmerica's buildings are "typically owned by corporations, typically located in small towns and typically sitting empty," he said. "We thought 'why not take them and breathe life back into them?" Most are in areas of declining economy. "While most people are running from those economies, we're running to them."

SeedAmerica believes in the entrepreneurial spirit. "It's not government's place to protect business," Zimmerman said. "Our passion is for business and entrepreneurship. We firmly believe America was made great by entrepreneurship and we need to stay that course."

While believing that government should not protect businesses, Zimmerman said if tax incentive money is available, SeedAmerica will request it. "It's a group effort," he said. "If a business succeeds, it helps the

City OKs photo studio, takes no action on liquor request

A Hoopeston alderman asked for and received approval to operate a photography studio from his home.

In a 4-0 vote, the Hoopeston City Council last week approved a request from Carl Ankenbrand for a conditional use for his home at 822 S. Fourth St., allowing him to operate a photography studio, Bonpas Creek Photography.

Ankenbrand abstained on the vote.

In unrelated business, the council:

• Heard from Ankenbrand that the city is applying for an ADM grant to repair the civic center kitchen. Ankenbrand also reminded residents to clean up after they walk their dogs at McFerren Park and asked residents to follow the two-per-day take limit at the park lagoon. The lagoon is primarily for children, the disabled and the elderly, he said.

• Took no action on a request from Convenient Food Mart for a license for hard liquor. Alderwoman Nancy Stipp said no licenses are available.

• Approved a bid from Russ Leigh & Associates for the annual audit for no more than \$4,400.

• Heard from Ed Hubbard of Witchschool who asked what happens to petitions not acted on by the city. The question was directed at a petition presented three years ago by those who objected to Witchschool opening in Hoopeston. In related discussion, Hubbard summarized the last three years saying that while early on was "one of the most difficult moments," people are now "amazed at Hoopeston" because of the lack of violence or vandalism shown towards Wiccans. With the exception of a few private businesses and individuals, "Hoopeston has become a model of tolerance," he said. "It's the safest place I've ever been in my life."
